A Message from the Head of School

Dear Parents.

Can you quickly identify our school's largest classroom? Need a hint? It is approximately 17,000 square feet and can accommodate hundreds of participants and spectators. The classroom to which I refer is, of course, our new gymnasium. You may ask why I refer to a sports facility as a classroom. Can you equate a gymnasium where children play basketball, volleyball and a host of other sports to a classroom? The answer is an emphatic, yes! The lessons learned in the gymnasium profoundly affect our students and how they live their lives. Our gymnasium is a living laboratory where children learn lessons of leadership and develop their character. The behaviors and responsibilities of students in the gymnasium are not markedly different from the behaviors students must demonstrate in their regular classrooms, albeit sometimes under more difficult conditions and circumstances.

Using the new gymnasium as a giant midot classroom, our students learn the lesson of sportsmanship under the able tutelage of our teachers and coaches. Sportsmanship has been described as playing fair, losing without complaint and winning without gloating. If, as adults, our graduates can navigate life's challenges demonstrating good sportsmanship in everything they do, they will live lives of integrity and character. Our children will grow up to be courteous and generous in both victory and defeat.

Our new gymnasium, on a daily basis, provides our students with a state-of-the-art facility where they can hone their athletic skills and apply the lessons of sportsmanship provided by our teachers and coaches. It was with great pride that we watched our Middle School Girls Basketball Team win Hillel Day School's first league championship. Throughout the season, the girls constantly strove to improve. Their coaches worked diligently with the team to improve their basketball skills and teamwork. But more importantly, they set an example for our students to emulate during stressful and challenging situations. When calls went against the team, Coach Jeffrey Harris showed them how to accept these decisions with equanimity. When other teams sometimes displayed behaviors not in keeping with good sportsmanship, he and his assistant, Basya Orzechowitz, encouraged the team not to reciprocate, to take the high road.

Lessons of sportsmanship are not limited to team sports but are an integral part of the physical education program at Hillel. Coaches Maia Shaffer and Moishe Aquart do not abide taunting, trash talking or intimidation. They constantly remind students that a bad pass, more often than a bad call, will lose a game. Students who engage in negative behaviors during physical education classes quickly find themselves sitting. I have heard our P.E. teachers lauding students for their interpersonal skills far more frequently than for their athletic prowess.

Hillel Day School Athletics seek to teach lessons of trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and good citizenship. Chazal teach us (Avot 2:1), "What is the proper path that a person should choose for himself? Whatever is a credit to him and earns him esteem from his fellow man." Our P.E. program gives our students another opportunity to apply this important Rabbinic dictum to everyday life.



effects are already being felt in many areas. An area of concern brought up in the last parent survey, was Midot (character building). We are presently utilizing a curriculum in which the teachers focus on various Midot, applying them to the suitable age and emotional level of the students. For example, the teachers may be teaching "Savlanut," patience. In younger grades it may simply be waiting your turn in line. In older grades, it may translate to having patience for a fellow classmate who may be having difficulty in the classroom. This is a constant work in progress and we will monitor this area to develop and stress refined Midot. Approximately one month ago, we began an Oneg Shabbat program for 1st through 5th grades, held each Friday morning. We focus on Parsha questions, a story, and the "Grand EMET" winner (to further recognize good Midot). This has been positively met by the students! If you pull up to Hillel in the morning and walk into the building, you will hear music playing. This is thanks to our new sound system that functions inside and throughout the entire campus! It is so nice to come and hear music playing early in the morning. Many programs took place in honor of Chanukah. Teachers hosted classes in their homes, some classes performed on the Hillel campus in the evenings and some performed during the daytime for parents to attend as well. Besides the class Chanukah programs, the B'not Sherut worked hard to coordinate programs for 1st through 5th graders each day of Chanukah. The 7th and 8th grade classes celebrated Shabbat with our annual Shabbaton held on the Hillel campus. The theme of the program was "Teamwork" and the activities coordinated by the teachers all involved stressing the importance of cooperation and working together for a common goal. The children had an amazing time and the food was delicious! During Chanukah, 4th through 8th graders were treated to an amazing appearance by Tamir

Goodman. He gave an inspirational talk to the students about his experience in choosing to give up playing for a Division I college basketball team because Shabbat comes first! He did workshops with the classes and treated them to autographs. Surely his message hit home! Shooby Doob paid us a visit and entertained the children! They sang along to his many favorite tunes, including Rabbi Levine's favorite, "It's Shooby Doob Time." I regularly take this opportunity to inform you about the exciting, creative, inspirational and everchanging programs that take place in the Upper School. As the programs are varied, so are their goals. Some seek to bring

Don't our students see enough of their teachers during the school day? Why do teachers create programs that infringe upon students' private time and even bring students into their homes? The answer is that, ultimately, it's all about relationships. Whether you are searching through Torah sources or modern day educational literature, both are replete with information that highlights the importance of healthy teacherstudent relationships. A truly productive and enjoyable education simply cannot be had without it, particularly when the curriculum is valuesladen. The past months have been a whirlwind of activity inside and outside the classrooms. Thanksgiving was a great way for students to learn





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A Thinking Expedition: Journey into the Unknown By: Emily Rosenstein, English Department Chair



Just a few days before families gathered for a joyful Thanksgiving, I traveled to Philadelphia for the 99th Annual Conference for the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE). To my astonishment, upon entering the Convention Center, the surge of people filling the grandiose hall and filing in and out of conference rooms resembled frantic holiday shoppers searching for the perfect gifts. As I assimilated into this group, attending the first session, I further assessed my initial classification of my peers: I realized how similar we English teachers were to holiday shoppers on a treasure hunt of our own. While we

were not gallivanting around the nation's malls in pursuit of presents and swiping our credit cards in attainment of our finds, we were trepid explorers with a literary map, searching for our own gilded treasures. For four days, we sailed from session to session, meeting like-minded colleagues and preeminent authors, determined to discover new techniques, tools, and materials for the teaching of language and literature. With these guides as a compass, English teachers of today renewed existing convictions and gained pioneering, inventive skills to better navigate through the uncharted waters that await in the school years ahead. I was that explorer; I am that English teacher.

So I sailed along the literary sea, cramming my four days with experiences that not only inform the teaching of the disciplines within an English Language Arts curriculum but also impact its instruction across the many grade levels at Hillel Day School. Day after day, I listened to remarkable, even legendary, authors like Gordon Korman, Nicholas Sparks, and Julie Andrews share their perspectives on reading and writing. I attended over a dozen sessions led by accomplished, innovative practitioners as well as principal researchers in the field. As I gained unparalleled exposure to various and harmonious researchbased theories unanimously indicating a necessity to focus on high-order thinking skills, I reflected on my practice. Are my students thinkers? Do they think critically? Do they think enough? I wondered if we, at Hillel, are shaping our students to be thinkers. Since Hillel is among the nation's educational mosaic, I believe it is our responsibility to not simply prepare our students for the next linear level of schooling; rather, it is our duty to equip them with a personal repertoire of creative skills to navigate the unknown oceans of our ever-changing and ever-growing technological world. Somewhere along the way, we have neglected the student's own dialogue with his learning; we have ignored his voice.

Through my experience as a participant in this year's NCTE conference, I uncovered a new mantra; as a teacher I am more than a conduit of knowledge. It is my role to guide my students and empower them to ask their own questions. For example, when students read a piece of literature, they typically respond to a list of questions we, the English teachers, provide; yet, first and foremost, I realize that students must read the text with meta-cognitive awareness. Students should confidently and consistently "talk-back" to the book, writing on post-its or in the margins about what they are noticing, feeling, thinking, and even beginning to infer. These are the ideas that typically lie dormant during reading since students wait to be told what is important or what is right. Learning though is not merely a journey of correctness; it is a journey of discovery. From reading to writing to each area of the English language arts Sponsored By: curriculum, teachers can model thinking skills. Critical thinking is teachable. Therefore, with my newly enthused commitment to the field and to our school, I pledge to steer Hillel's young minds on a thinking expedition, sailing into a rapidly changing tomorrow today.
