A Message from the Head of School

Dear Parents,

I am writing for the final *Hillel Herald* of the year which means that I am also making my annual plea to parents, asking them to make certain that their children read over the summer. The importance of summer reading cannot be overstated as the following statement indicates: "Regardless of other activities, the best predictor of summer loss or summer gain is whether or not a child reads during the summer" (McGill-Franzen, Allington, 2010). Studies reveal that children from disadvantaged families show a significant loss in reading skills over the summer, primarily because children from such families, for various reasons, do not have access to books over the summer. It would be a terrible shame for any of our students, who live in homes that place such a high value on learning, to experience a summer reading loss because we have not included reading in our children's daily activities.

For those parents who are blessed to have children who are avid readers, this task is more easily accomplished than for parents whose children are reluctant readers. To help children who are not voluntary readers, parents must find books that "fit." Giving students overly-challenging books to read will sap the joy out of the reading experience and will contribute to a word-by-word struggle to figure out unfamiliar words. This type of reading does not engage the student in reading and ultimately proves to be counterproductive. Lower-achieving readers and reluctant readers should be asked to read regularly from books that can be read easily and with good comprehension. Such reading will allow students to consolidate gains achieved over the course of the school year and will also promote a better attitude toward reading.

Studies show that students who read as few as six books over the summer maintain their reading levels, and that more reading can actually lead to reading gains over the summer. We, who seek to give our children every advantage in life, must make certain that books are readily accessible to our children, whether through visits to the library or the book store. As parents, we must follow through on our obligation to make certain our children read regularly during the summer.

Please accept my best wishes for a healthy and restful summer. If you are in the neighborhood, drop in and say hello. We would love to see you.

On April 12 of this year I had the privilege to address your students on Yom Hashoa. I must say that the behavior and respect that I was shown was exemplary. As I always say that the Holocaust was a tragedy and can not be sanitized. It was a time of brutality and carnage against our 6 million innocent brothers and sisters who gave their lives of Kiddush Hashem. Yet in the course of my speech I noticed the intensity in their faces wanting to know and to hear the witness to the beastly atrocities endured by the Jewish people. I must commend you and your faculty in educating the students and preparing them in ways of prevention of the catastrophe of the Holocaust in the future. I have heard it say that "History is capable on repetition," but judging by the intensity of their concentration of this historical subject,I know that we are in for a better tomorrow. KAR²E KOLUMN

This year's KAR²E program has included activities, special field trips and a variety of educational programs designed to make a real impact on the level of our students pro-social behavior and moral reasoning. It is our hope that these efforts have resulted in a change in our students, both in school and in their interpersonal relationships, and in their level of Judaic commitment at home and in our communities.

Toward this end the final KAR²E program of the year was designed to allow the students to think about how some of the rules we enforce in school would also be beneficial to them in various other settings in which they may find themselves. Along with the rules governing basic "menchlichkeit" we also wanted the students to consider some of the rules which govern their religious observances in order to recognize the importance of these ideas and the incorporation of them into their everyday lives.

During the month of May the students discussed with their Judaic Studies teachers about how the school rules of Kashrut, Tzniut, Kippot, Teffilin, Tzizit, and the recitation of Brachot, Birkat HaMazon and the daily Tefilot could effect a positive influence on their daily existence. Each teacher and administrator shared with the students a personal story or example of how adherence to these rules has improved their own lives. The students were then asked to write some thoughts about how keeping the rules at all times could help them accomplish more in the "real world."

As with any type of learning, lessons that are reinforced by actions have a better chance of being retained. This is not only true of math, science, Chumash or Torah SheBaal Peh, but it is equally true of lessons on morality, ethics and religious observance. As we approach the summer vacation it behooves us all to review with our children the importance of all that they have learned so that the efforts of the teachers and staff and the financial and emotional investment of the parents do not go to waste.

Some practical suggestions for the summer include having continuing discussions with your children about moral and ethical standards. This could take the form of the discussion of a theoretical scenario around the Shabbat or weekday dinner table or a review of real life moral and ethical dilemmas that may have presented themselves to you or your children. Another suggestion is for parents to make every effort to maintain the children's religious observances throughout the summer months. The most effective way of doing this is to set personal examples for them. In addition there are a plethora of quality books written for teens and pre-teens which promote positive morals and Torah observance. Such books will not only help the students improve their reading skills but will also help to reinforce all that they have learned this year. Wishing you all a restful and productive summer!
