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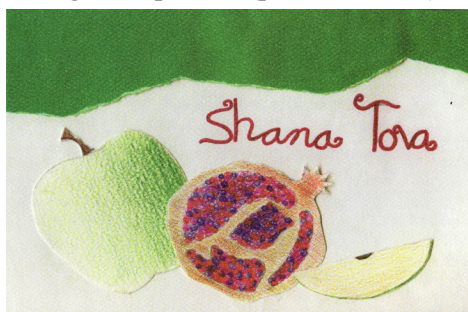

A Message from the Head of School, Rabbi Samuel J. Levine



Dear Parents,

With the conclusion of the Chagim, the school year begins anew. Although a mainstay of the rhythm of Jewish life, the Tishrei holidays prove to be a challenge when it comes to maintaining focus on school-related activities. The return of the five-day school week should help students regain the focus and intensity required for effective learning. An important component of effective learning, particularly in a Torah day school, is homework.

With the explosion of technology and the concomitant increase in information, greater demands are made of schools to adapt their teaching styles to accommodate the changing nature of knowledge. For instance, nationwide, the last decade has seen a decrease in instructional time of 31% in subject areas other than language and mathematics. This was necessitated by the need to accommodate the different approaches to teaching core subjects. Students now need to learn to access and process voluminous amounts of information and apply this information to solving the yet unknown challenges of the future. The higher order thinking skills involved in this teaching/learning process require more classroom time than did the more traditional curriculum of the past century.

Basic skills, however, cannot be ignored in this new paradigm. Students still need to learn to read and write, students still need to compute, and students still need to be able to translate a posuk from Chumash or Tanach. There is less time available to reinforce these skills in today's classrooms, hence the increasing importance of homework. Children must spend time at home honing basic skills and reviewing lessons taught. Time on task, defined as the period of time during which a student is actively engaged in a learning activity, is essential to acquire these basic skills. Some of this time on task, by necessity, must be spent at home. To be sure, homework should not become an onerous task. For children in the elementary grades, parents can help by providing support and guidance, by becoming homework coaches. This does not necessarily mean doing homework with your child. Before beginning homework, parents can help their children make a homework plan. The following questions should be asked and answered:

- What am I going to do first?
- What do I do next (and so on)?
- How long should it take me for each assignment?
- What is the total time needed?
- Why is this assignment important?

Finally, a cap should be placed on the amount of time spent on homework based on the suggested times found in the *Parent/Student Manual* (page 15). If your child has worked the suggested amount of time and has not finished, then simply write a note to the teacher indicating this.

We must remember that time plus energy equals learning. There is no substitute for time on task.

Baruch Hashem, it has been a wonderful year thus far in the Upper School. Our academic program is stronger than ever, the programming is exciting and innovative, and the students are truly enjoying their school experience. I would like to take this opportunity to inform you about the many enhancements to our already stellar program.

KAR²E: Our exciting, ever-evolving middot (character development) program, KAR²E (Kindness Always, Respect and Responsibility Everywhere), will have a major enhancement for this upcoming year. All Middle School students will spend 25 minutes each Wednesday participating in "KAR²E Circles." Small groups of students along with two of their teachers will have the opportunity to discuss a wide variety of KAR²E-related issues in a safe, non-judgmental atmosphere. Social inclusion, chesed/volunteerism, honesty, respecting parents, and peer pressure are only a few of the crucial topics that will be touched upon. Most importantly, these discussions will be largely driven by the students themselves.

Religious/Social Guidance: Each Middle School student will meet privately and on a regular basis with mechanech or mechanechet (teacher advisor). Rabbi Mordechai Smolarcik is the mechanech for the boys and Mrs. Rina Lanner is the mechanechet for the girls. Rabbi Smolarcik and Mrs. Lanner will have the opportunity to truly get to know your children well and help guide them through some of the challenges that face Middle School students.

The overall purpose of this program is to ensure that every student is having an enjoyable Middle School experience and is growing religiously, socially, and emotionally.

Science Enhancements: For the past two years, we have had the opportunity to bring 5th graders into the Science Lab on a weekly basis. Students have loved the experience, and the program is being further improved for this year. We will now be bringing the 4th graders as well to the Science Lab for this weekly, hands-on science experience!

Toshba (Talmud) Curriculum: We are now completing the second and final year of our ground-breaking, two year Toshba curriculum for 7th and 8th graders. Not only do our students learn Gemara in the traditional sense with a heavy emphasis on thinking and skills development, but they learn it within sections that are relevant to their daily lives, making Gemara study that much more engaging and interesting.

Extra-Curricular Opportunities: To complement our current array of out-of-the-classroom learning experiences such as sports teams and clinics, Art Institute, literature magazine, student council and math team, we will be adding various clubs/programs to encourage more students to get involved in areas they find interesting. Torah Lab, Israel Advocacy, Business Club, Kiruv (outreach) Club, and Chesed Club are only some of the programs that are currently in formation. The student body will be surveyed to assess student interest in other potential areas.

HillelTube! Approximately once every month, you will be emailed a link taking you

to a video highlighting the learning and excitement that is the hallmark of the HDS Middle School experience. Be on the lookout for photos and videos of your children!

Resources for Parents: Parenting an "upper school student" can be a complex and arduous task! To help you navigate through the challenges of Upper School and, in a healthy way, address with your child issues relating to peer pressure, homework, organization, discipline, reading for enjoyment, bullying etc., we will be e-mailing to you each month a two-sided sheet filled with short articles and stories that touch upon these and other topics.

Professional Development for Teachers: We are expanding our current professional development initiative known as "Critical Friends" to include a well known and highly effective component called "Peer Coaching." Both of these models encourage teachers to learn from the expertise of their colleagues on a regular basis and in the ideal, job-embedded environment.

Midot in Motion: To reinforce lessons learned in school, we will publish a bi-weekly newsletter that will focus on a variety of topics such as anger management, respecting parents, giving others the benefit of the doubt, empathy, and honesty.

Healthy Eating Habits: A professional health counselor will be teaching individual classes about healthy eating habits.

KidSafe Internet Safety Program: Students will experience a 4-week program that will empower them to research the Internet safely and

explore the world of technology properly and productively.

New Middle School Building: Last but certainly not least, we have plans to move into our new Middle School building at the midpoint of the year. The students and teachers are so excited to make use of the beautiful new classrooms, Beit Midrash, state-of-the-art science lab, student lounge area and so much more!

As many of you may know, we spend considerable time throughout the year, particularly during the spring and summer, re-evaluating existing programs and thinking about how we can make our school better. Over the past couple of years we have instituted a new reading and math program. These programs have allowed our children to work at a variety of levels that meet their individualized educational needs. We have seen tremendous results from these programs, which have truly enhanced the emotional and educational requirements of our children.

Please take the time to read through the information provided below as it will give you a glimpse of the enhancements and improvements your children will experience in the year ahead.

EMET Bands (Excellent Midot Every Time) for students in EC3-5th grades:

In addition to our EMET notes, we are excited to announce EMET bands. Those children who go above and beyond and receive an EMET note, will now also receive an EMET band bracelet. The EMET band is another way that children can walk around school and be recognized for their commitment to Midot. I would like to thank Gwenn Lerman and Pam Gene for helping to make this program so successful.

KidSafe Internet Safety Program (Grades 1-3):

The students will take an 8-week educational journey to discover safe ways to do research and explore their world using technology. They will be meeting once a week with the KidSafe staff (October-November) to discuss how technology can be used as a positive tool to enhance our lives, as well as how to interpret the red flags that can pose potential dangers. Parents were invited to a parent workshop on September 12th, to hear about what the children are learning

and, additionally, received talking points to discuss with their children. We will also send out weekly updates letting parents know what was discussed during that week's lesson.

Science (EC4-3rd grade):

In addition to the science embedded in our regular curriculum, science instructors from "Hightouch Hightech," a company that specializes in providing hands-on science experiences for young children, will provide our students with exciting state-of-the-art science classes on a regular basis. Our children in 2nd and 3rd grades will be taught by Cheryl Rosen, one of our Middle School science teachers.

Judaics Kindergarten Curriculum:

We are excited to announce that we have finished a 2-year process that has greatly enhanced our Kindergarten Judaics curriculum. 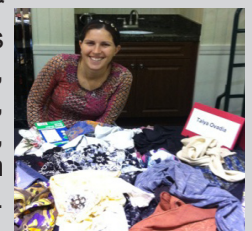

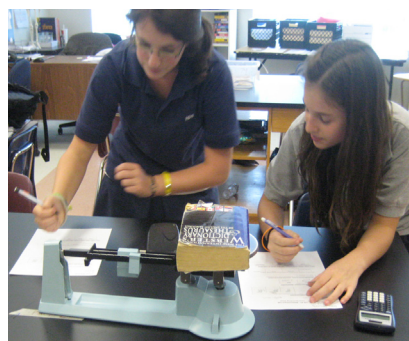

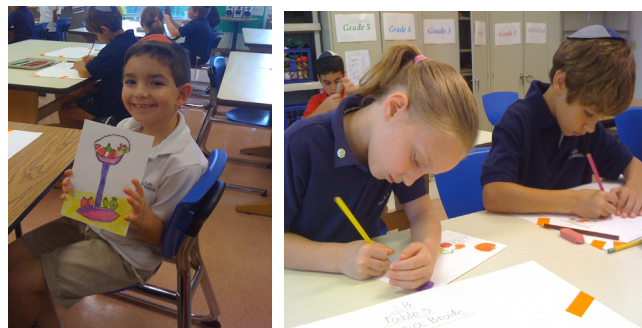


The 1st and 4th graders work together several times during the year sharing in Chavruta learning.

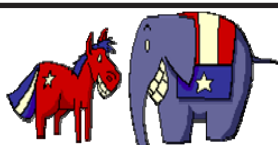

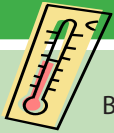
Girls Volleyball

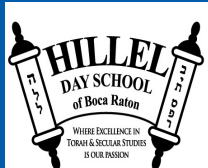

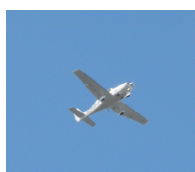
