A MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL...

ascinating, intriguing, inspiring and motivating are just some of the words that come to mind when I think back upon my experience this past summer at The Principals' Center of The Harvard Graduate School of Education. Thanks to the generosity and vision of the Avi

Chai Foundation, I was accepted to a 14-person cohort of heads of school/principals of Jewish day schools from across North America for an intensive, week-long seminar entitled "Leading an Emerging Vision." We joined another 160 school leaders from all over the globe including those from Australia, Saudi Arabia, India, China, Europe and all over the United States.

We were engrossed in sessions from some of the most respected researchers and thought leaders in education today on a wide range of topics such as Universal Design for Learning, Effective Family-School Partnerships, Maximizing the Impact of Technology for Learning, School Culture, Strategy in Action, Leading Change and so much more. A significant emphasis of the overall program was placed upon taking the theory and bringing it to action. I have already incorporated some of my learning into my daily routine and, with the help of a consultant from Avi Chai, we will soon begin a specific, long term school improvement initiative that emanates from the learning at Harvard and that furthers the Jewish mission of our school. I look forward to writing about that in a future edition of The Hillel Herald.

While at Harvard, two "feel good" thoughts continuously circled through my mind. The first was that we should be so incredibly proud of our school and our commitment to excellence in education. Of course, we must always grow and improve - that is essential to who we are and why I attended this program in the first place. But it was great to hear how in line we are with so many best practices and philosophies in education today. Secondly, almost every school leader I met and interacted with (and there were a lot!) was so thoughtful, passionate, giving, caring and so deeply committed to improving their respective schools and communities. So despite the many articles and stories out there that paint a pessimistic portrait of our global educational system, these impressive leaders left me with an overwhelming sense of optimism and belief that our future, through our children and their education, is bright indeed!

The Centers of Our Year!

What an incredible start to our school year! As I walk through the classes, I cannot help but feel excitement about all of the incredible, hands-on, focused, individualized learning going on in each and every room. I admit I am biased :), but as an educator, and as a person who truly loves to observe

the science of education, seeing true differentiated instruction, allowing children to learn and work at skills that are meaningful to them, is, to me, truly a thing of beauty.

Our lower school classrooms have embraced the model of centerbased learning, which has allowed our inquisitive minds to learn in small groups of 5 to 7 students. If you walk into a classroom you will find four centers running simultaneously: Math, Reading, Writing, and Technology. Except for the Technology Center, each center is facilitated by a teacher in order to maximize the learning quality of the children. More than ever before, children have the opportunity to be more engaged, participate further, and get direct instruction from teachers. As opposed to the single teacher model where one teacher facilitates the entire class on a single journey throughout the year, an approach like ours certainly takes more collaboration among several teachers, but allows for 20(!) different journeys with the same destination at the end of the year! This is a new way to keep our amazing KHDS student minds active and engaged!

One of the most popular expressions used in recent years is the expression "being chill" (when I was younger--I date myself--we said being "cool"). The word can be used as a verb, as in, "I am chillin," or an adjective, "he is so chill." There seems to be a great emphasis in today's society on being chill, of not reacting too strongly to things but rather being fun-

loving and living in the moment. At the other end of the spectrum is the rigid person, whom we may classify as the Type A individual, who by description is driven, intense, highly motivated to accomplish and will mercilessly try to whip him or herself and everyone around him or her into shape. This individual would probably be classified as the polar opposite of the "chill" individual.

Often times when faced with resistance, they will persevere while the chill individual might choose to take a nap. Type A individuals are useful and highly productive in society except for when they aren't. Abraham Maslow, a famous psychologist known for creating the "hierarchy of needs," once said that if a person has only one tool--a hammer--he will approach every problem as if it is a nail. Therefore, each of us needs many tools in the tool box to survive the challenges and obstacles in life. A wise person will know which tool to pull out for each and every job.

Yaakov Avinu is known as the "bechir ha'avot," the crown of the forefathers. How did he achieve this title? His grandfather, Avraham, was the paragon of Chesed--kindness. Avraham reacted first and foremost in every situation with this trait. Yitzchak, Yaakov's father, approached every situation with the trait of "Gevurah"--self-control and strength. This characteristic allowed for no flexibility. Yaakov represented "Tiferet," what is known as the beautiful synthesis of both of the above traits--adaptability! That is what made him the crown of the Avot--he was able to react with an appropriate reaction to each condition and experience in his life. He taught us by example that one must have a variety of possible reactions to the challenges that life brings. It is great to be driven and ambitious but it must have a sprinkling of "chill." Knowing how to ride the waves will keep our heads and hearts above the water. Teaching our children how to do so will help them remain graceful in the tides that will constantly come up in life.

BUSINESS OFFICE UPDATE Joe Sharp, Executive Director



Welcome back! There was a whirlwind of activity on campus this summer with record Camp Ruach enrollment and a number of improvements being made throughout our facilities. We appreciate all of the positive feedback from children and staff alike on the upgrades in areas such as the front offices, the hot lunch

program, classroom technology, and recreational spaces, and invite you all to come and see it for yourselves.

Finding the resources to invest in our extraordinary staff and making necessary improvements to our facilities is not an easy task. Continuing to do so throughout a 4-year tuition rate freeze, and looking ahead to a \$1,000 perchild tuition reduction in '17/'18 is even more daunting. Despite such limited resources, we are also keenly aware of world events and the need to continue to invest in campus security--one such measure being our intensive staff training and ongoing consulting with Guardian Defense.

Nevertheless, we are eager to make these critical investments and continue to maintain or lower tuition costs. To do so without further burdening our families, we are actively seeking outside sources to fund these projects. For instance, our technology infrastructure has been upgraded this summer thanks to the **Federal eRate** program. We are also grateful for steadily increasing funding from the Step Up for Students, Gardiner Scholarship, and McKay Scholarship programs.

In September, I had the privilege of joining a delegation to Washington, D.C. organized by the Orthodox Union. In private meetings with our legislators, we were able to advocate on behalf of our children for valuable programs such as the Energy Modernization Act, and the Nonprofit Security Grant- the latter of which we have been a recipient of, and hope to be again. This fall, I'll be organizing a coalition of our local Jewish schools to work under the guidance of **Agudath Israel** to best utilize the resources that may be available to us with the soon to be enacted ESSA bill.

We are looking forward to sharing updates and progress on these efforts, and hope to be able to continue to find alternative resources so that we may be able to add value to our programming, improve our facilities and energy efficiency, and elevate our campus security. We are proud to say that the education, resources, and facilities offered by Katz Hillel Day School are a model of all-around excellence, and are working hard to ensure, with Hashem's help, that we continue to be for many more years to come.
