A Message from the Head of School, Rabbi Samuel J. Levine



Dear Parents,


Every year, before summer vacation, I remind our families to make sure that children daven every day, that Torah study does not take the summer off and that there is no vacation from reading. All of these practices must continue as they are not school practices but rather practices for life. A Jew davens every day, learns Torah regularly and spends a lifetime engaged in activities that require reading whether for utilitarian purposes, for edification or for the pure pleasure of imbibing the written word. I suggest that included in this summer's reading should be regular reading from the newspaper. For younger children, parents can read an article with their children and discuss the importance of the information contained therein. Older students should read the paper on their own and then follow up these readings with discussions with their parents. Children can be directed to read articles of interest related to sports, technology or entertainment, for instance. Parents may also suggest articles that relate to Israel and its relationship with the United States. In this way, children can become acquainted with the complexities that exist in this bilateral relationship and form opinions, grounded in fact, regarding these sometimes thorny issues.

I recently participated in the AIPAC Conference in Washington, D.C. Being part of a diverse group of people, 10,000 strong, meeting in our nation's Capitol for the express purpose of supporting Medinat Yisrael, was an exhilarating experience. Sharing this experience with two of my grandchildren was particularly meaningful to me and impactful for them. Prior to attending with my grandchildren, I was not certain that attending an AIPAC Conference would be worthwhile for children in early adolescence. Having had the experience, and witnessing the reaction of the scores of young teens who were there, I can say without equivocation, that it was an extraordinarily worthwhile opportunity for them. Being in the same room with the President of the United States and then with the Prime Minister of the State of Israel, hearing them speak and then carefully analyzing their remarks, is an atypical occurrence for young teens. Having been given this opportunity and the opportunity to visit Capitol Hill and visit our elected representatives will inspire them to be more knowledgeable citizens who are mindful of the way we are governed.

But children cannot show up to such an event without having been prepared. Regular reading from the newspaper during the summer and throughout the year, coupled with regular discussions with parents about the important issues of the day, will prepare children to become more active participants in the political life of our country. I believe that, at one point during their teenage years, every child should have the opportunity to attend an AIPAC Conference. The summer months bring with them diminished demands on children in terms of required reading. We should utilize this time to read newspapers and start our children on the path to political activism and an informed, sophisticated approach to their role as citizens.

HDS was proud to once again lead the annual food drive to benefit the Forster Family Kosher Food Pantry. This year, several other local Jewish day schools joined our efforts to stock food and toiletry items on the shelves of the only kosher food pantry in Palm Beach County.

The Emerald City Murals of 5th Grade Art Classes

A collage is considered a work of art made from an assemblage of different forms, thus creating a new whole.

Its origins can be traced hundreds of years, but it made its reappearance in the early 20th century with such artists as Kurt Schwitters, Pablo Picasso and George Bracque. The concept extended into the 3-dimensional level with the Dad School and Marcel Duchamp. Found materials became part of the artists' vocabulary as the technique continues throughout the 20th century in a highly creative and conceptual form of expression. The artist has always been a recycler of materials; and so, our highly creative, conceptually oriented grade 5 students were able to become a new young group of recyclers creating art.

Our major purpose was to promote our Spring Theatrical Production, "The Wizard of Oz," through the creation of imaginative murals expressing an original concept of an Emerald City, either urban or suburban. Thus, we were dealing both with the idea of the Emerald City as well as with the idea of use of found materials to create a visual image. Students worked as teams of two or three. We viewed, on the SmartBoard, numerous Emerald City themes created by artists through the many years since the story

was first written. Architectural forms were also observed. Students went to work dealing with decision-making skills and all the technical skills they have accumulated over the years. A variety of recycled materials in many hues and values of green were presented. An assortment of drawing and painting materials as well as a variety of techniques also added to the creations. The exchange of ideas was wonderful to observe as were the materials students asked for and the solutions they had for using them. The choices offered in the art room, coupled with the continuous reinforcements of the elements and principles of art, resulted in many exciting images. They are now organized together in a large mural on the first floor. We thank Mrs. Stace Katzman, one of our parents who volunteered to assist in the art room with the many jobs that needed to be done. Thanks also to Leonardo Moran for his photos of the students at work.

The 5th grade art classes also worked on flyer designs portraying the characters in the play. These flyers were distributed to advertise the performance. Congratulations to Ayelet Gross, who created the winning poster design.
