NAMES, NOT NUMBERS® DOCUMENTARY PREMIERES FOR HUNDREDS

The premiere of the Holocaust documentary, Names, Not Numbers[©], an interactive, multi-media project, took place Monday evening, March 20, at Temple Beth Shalom in Century Village. The program was dedicated in blessed memory of *Mr. Harry Wanderer*, z''l, who sponsored the program in its inaugural year (2016).

The program, supported by the **Legacy Heritage Fund**, and partially sponsored by **Mr. and Mrs. Alex Folkman**, chronicled the lives of nine Holocaust survivors as well as the personal experiences of the KHDS 8th grade class, who worked for months on this project.



This program transforms the traditional study of the Holocaust into an interactive program that involves survivors who lived through the history. The 8th grade students, under the direction of **Rabbi Dr. Mordechai Smolarcik**, Faculty Coordinator, engaged in serious, meaningful dialogue with the survivors and forged relationships with them. In addition, throughout the program, the students learned interviewing techniques, documentary film tools,

and editing skills while working with professionals--journalists, newspaper editors, filmmakers, and Holocaust scholars.

Time really does fly when you are having fun! This is the culmination of another great year at KHDS, and with it comes the graduation of 56 students who are leaving us and embarking on the next stage in their academic lives. Each year as we graduate a class, I am filled with bittersweet emotions; I am happy for the students to move on but at

the same time, I reflect on each student and the actualization of each child's potential. Have the students reached and utilized that which they are most capable of in the stepping stones of academic achievement and success?

As I am writing this article, we are in the midst of the counting of the Omer. Everyone knows that we count in ascending order and not as a countdown (not like the students counting down how many days of school are left). In the Tanna Dvei Eliyahu Zuta, there is a story of a man who was constantly mocking Eliyahu Hanavi. This man was a fisherman by profession who was totally devoid of any Torah knowledge, not even having mastered the "aleph-bet." One day, Eliyahu stopped the man and asked, "What are you going to say in the Heavenly Court after 120 years, when you will be asked why you did not learn Torah?" The man responded, "I will say that I was not given the intelligence needed to ponder and learn Torah." then said, "As a fisherman, what do you need to know?" The man proceeded to describe the intricate details necessary to successfully fish, right down to the intricacies of making the nets and traps. As the man spoke, he realized that he contradicted himself—he began to cry as he realized that he did have intellectual capacity!

The Kotzker Rebbe goes further and explains this Midrash. He says, the man really was weak in intellectual capacity but he realized that if he did not fish, he would die of hunger. The strong desire to fish brought out capabilities that he did not originally have and he overcame his natural potential because his life depended on it. With this message, we see that one can create new potential if one's wishes, aspirations and desires are strong enough.

Our children have dreams and goals. We must help them reach and aspire to achieve the lofty goals which every child is capable of attaining. Getting back to the reason for counting Sefirah in ascending order, it is that the ultimate goal is important but every day must be utilized fully for the goal to be achieved— "We do not merely count the days, we must make the days count." (Taken from a Shiur of Rabbi Zev Leff.)

Thank you, **Ori & Inbar**, for all you have done to teach our children during the school year.

BUSINESS OFFICE UPDATE Joe Sharp, Executive Director



hursday, June 15, 2017, bridged the gap between the close of an incredible 2016/17 school year and the start of another amazing summer of **Camp Ruach**. During their busy orientation day, our camp staff also underwent security training from Guardian Defense. Our campus was buzzing with a flurry of activity as our dedicated maintenance staff prepared our facilities for the summer while refreshing and

upgrading our campus ahead of the next school year.

June 15th also served as a reminder that we are fortunate to be in a time of historic legislation on both the federal and state levels, of which we are, and hope to continue to be, the grateful beneficiaries. Late in the afternoon, we received word that **Governor Scott** signed HB7069 and is about to sign HB15, which will greatly expand the Gardiner Scholarship program for special needs and increase the award amounts for the tax credit scholarship program (Step Up for Students and AAA Scholarship) to 8%-18% per-child.

Those bills were passed in the same legislative session that approved approximately \$650,000 of state funds to go directly towards security upgrades in Jewish day schools. This landmark allocation was initiated by the Teach Florida advocacy group and championed to the finish line through its tireless efforts. Teach Florida, a part of the Orthodox Union Advocacy Center, was just established this year. As a founding member school, we are proud of their accomplishments thus far, and appreciative of their hard work and the generosity of the lay leadership that has made their vision a reality.

I was privileged to represent our community on the OU Advocacy Mission in spending June 15th in Washington, D.C. We had meaningful discussions in the offices of **Florida Representatives** Carlos Curbelo and Rep. Ron DeSantis covering several topics including expansion of the Homeland Security Grant for Nonprofits and the creation of the Energy Efficiencency Grant for Nonprofits. We were inspired by the passion and support shown for our community in speaking with Representatives Virginia Foxx



Our own **Rabbi Englander** was one of only 3 heads of school throughout the country to be invited to present to the trustees of the Avi Chai Foundation in New York this past May. Over many years, Avi Chai has invested heavily in many aspects of Jewish education, especially in Jewish educational leadership. Rabbi Englander has benefited directly from their investments, including the Harvard Principal Leadership Program he attended last summer.

and Elliot Engel, and Senators Ben Cardin, Ted Cruz, Orrin Hatch, John Hoeven, Robert Menendez, Bill Nelson, Debbie Stabenow, and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer.

The highlight of our day, however, was our time at the White House. We heard from the President's Special Representative for Interntional Relations, the Hon. Jason Greenblatt, and Deputy Assistant to the President, the Hon. Sebastian Gorka. We were then honored to hear from the Secretary of Education, the Hon. Betsy DeVos with whom we discussed a number of avenues being actively pursued through which the Federal government can facilitate school choice, such as tax deductions or a tax credit scholarship program. As I boarded the plane home feeling energized by the overwhelming support shown by our elected officials and the success of our work in advancing KHDS's causes, I received a special bracha for hatzlacha from my seat mate, former U.S. Senator Joseph Lieberman.

These and other efforts have contributed greatly to our ability to set tuition rates lower than they were 6 years ago while continuing to add to our educational resources and upgrade our facilities. The events on June 15th are a representation of the good fortune that Hashem continues to bestow upon the KHDS family, and we pray, G-D willing, that they will continue to enable us to reach even greater heights at sustainable costs on behalf of your children, for many more years to come.
