Head of School Message



Rabbi Yehudah Potok, M.S. Ed., Head of School

Dear KHDS Community, It has been a great privilege over the course of this year to listen to and learn from our various constituents. I have spoken with parents, board members, and community leaders. I have learned from teachers, staff, donors and, of course, students. Clearly, we have a community that cares deeply about our school, a community that works diligently for Hillel to succeed. We have an amazing program that offers our students a myriad of opportunities for growth. And yet, we cannot rest on our laurels but we must advance

in our pursuit of excellence.

Judaic Studies Extension – Mechina Program

Over the past number of years, we have witnessed an increased number of students who, in seeking to grow in terms of their Jewish education, enter KHDS without the prerequisite skills and knowledge for their grade levels Judaic Studies Classes. It is incumbent upon us to make sure that we offer these students every opportunity to strengthen their Judaic and Hebrew skills.

• We will therefore create a Mechina (Preparatory) Track that will enable us to teach these basic skills thereby allowing students to then enter the regular Judaic Studies

General Studies Excellence - Focus on Language Arts

We are incredibly fortunate to have such a strong general studies program and fantastic staff that prepare our students for high school and beyond. However, we must always strive for growth in all that we do. To this end, we have chosen to evaluate our language arts program specifically with regards to writing.

· Over the past few months and into next year, we will continue working with an outside educational consultant, with a background in curriculum review and evaluation, specifically in the area of Language Arts, to help us review and evaluate our LA curriculum. Based on this review, we will implement strategies that will help students think critically and creatively about written texts and to be able to communicate their ideas effectively.

• This curriculum review will be the first step in a school-wide curriculum review.

Middle School Growth

We are blessed to have a growing middle school with expanded opportunities for learning. With growth comes another opportunity to strengthen our program. In this transitional adolescent period, students deal with changes developmentally, socially, and academically. Our students' growth and development is our primary focus and we will continue to develop the culture of our growing middle school to support our students' needs during this transitional time in their lives.

- Our goal is to support our students in easing their transition from elementary school to high school.
- We will create an advisory system for the coming school year so that each student has a faculty advisor.
- We have reviewed our student schedules, and have already implemented changes to make classroom transitions smoother and provide needed break times for students.

Athletics

Athletics is an incredible strength within our program with ever-increasing opportunities in sports teams, clinics, and PE. As a school, we look to educate the whole child. Enabling physical outlets that also build collaborative and leadership skills, I believe, are so important to provide.

 We will therefore continue to add more opportunities for students to play team sports and work on their athletic skills.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math)

STEM is an ever-evolving field. We have done some incredible things in our school related to STEM such as creating our new and improved Makerspace which has been well used by our 4th-8th grade students. We have brought in the CIJE (Center for Initiatives in Jewish Education) curriculum this year to help our students explore engineering concepts in greater depth. In our older grades, we have also introduced robotics.

• For next year, we will bring robotics and coding to the younger grades.

- We will also better integrate technology into the classrooms with greater access to chromebooks for blended learning opportunities. Included in this initiative will be updating and improving hardware and educational software throughout the campus.
- Better preparation also means knowing how to appropriately use technology with Torah-based values.

These again, are some of the key areas that we will be focused on next year as we continue to advance our program. A great school is always evolving and looking for best practices. We will continue to build on proven approaches while moving toward meaningful innovation. I am excited to have such a talented staff to work with on developing and implementing these ideas and look forward to the profound impact that these programmatic enhancements will have on our students' experience.

I write this article having just returned from the 13th trip to Eretz Yisrael with the 8th grade students and I am feeling elated and proud. During the course of this intense trip, the students constantly amazed me as they demonstrated strong Middot and good values. They also enthusiastically shared what they have learned about past and current Israel

history and an understanding of the importance of the Land of Eretz Yisrael. Moreso than ever, with the constant anti-Israel rhetoric found on many campuses and social media, it is vital that our children know the full truth and have a love of Eretz Yisrael so that they are able to respond intellectually and passionately to the naysayers who they will undoubtedly encounter in their lives.

Knowledge, though, is not enough, and we at KHDS, work hard to instill passion, and dedication to Torah and Mitzvot. Rabbi Ephraim Shapiro shared a powerful message and thought about dedication. In the Haftorah of Parshat Parah, the word "neshama" appears and there it is translated to mean desolate. Without vowels it has the same exact letters as the word "neshama," which is defined as soul. One word means void and empty while the other word represents life. What is the difference? In the first example the word is spelled with a "patach" under the shin, while "neshama" (soul) is written with a "kamatz." The kamatz has a small leg to stand on while the patach does not. When a student has support and sees the devotion and good examples of proper dedication and commitment of teachers and parents, the student then knows what values are important in life. He or she will, in turn, emulate those values in their lives.

I would like to thank the teachers who are outstanding role models and show dedication, devotion and commitment to the children on a daily basis. BETTER TOGETHER CELEBRATION DINNER AND 1ST PLACE NATIONAL BetterTogether ESSAY WINNER ANNOUNCED

The Better Together Program continued to inspire our 8th grade students through the remainder of the school year as they further developed the meaningful relationships with their partners at Sinai Residences. Monthly visits gave them the opportunity to learn from and enjoy the company of the residents -- and vice versa!

"At the beginning of the school year, 8th grade student participants were matched with a senior partner from our school's campus neighbor, Sinai Residences," said Rina Lanner, Program Coordinator. "The students and seniors participated in a variety of programs and activities throughout the year including a Chanukah party, Shabbat Friday night services, flower arranging and playing favorite games," she added. The life experiences of the Sinai Residences participants have left an indelible impression on the students and the seniors also benefited from the relationships and camaraderie. A celebration dinner was held at the culmination of the program in May and the students' parents were also invited to meet their children's senior partner.





The Better2Write contest, a subsidiary project, offered a forum for students to express how they were impacted by the program, as reflected in their feelings about seniors, aging and the mitzvah of caring for the elderly. Ariella Mayer achieved national recognition for her winning essay submission. She was awarded first place from the 600 submissions entered into the contest. As the national winner, she has won a generous scholarship to a Jewish summer experience of her choice. In addition, KHDS

will receive a very substantial grant toward the scholarship fund. "This grant will allow us to reach our \$700,000 Annual Campaign goal," said Rabbi Yehudah Potok, Head of School. "KHDS awards over \$1.8 million in scholarships annually and certainly Ariella's achievement will benefit many families," he added.



Ariella's submission was written in the form of a letter to her partner, Marsha Leifer (see her winning letter to the right). She also received a certificate of achievement after reading her winning submission to her partner at the celebration dinner. They will now share a lifelong bond from their experiences, thanks to this program.

Better Together is a two-year program generously supported by a prominent national foundation and designed to encourage meaningful interaction between young and old.

Dear Marsha, Love Ariella Bv: Ariella Maver

"I'm the old one here; I thought I was supposed to be teaching you things." You said this to me during one of our meetings awhile back. We were talking and I told you something you didn't know. True to your personality, you responded with this witty comeback that made us both laugh. Although I don't remember the events leading up to or following this comment, this one line stuck with me. Maybe it's just because it was a funny one-liner and it made us laugh. Maybe it's because it reminded me of something I would say. Whatever the reason is, I'm happy I didn't forget it. Now, looking back on it, I realize that that one joke you made really encompasses my entire experience in this program.

When I first heard about Better Together, I knew that I wanted to participate. For me, it was a chance to get to know people whom I wouldn't have met otherwise. I didn't really know what to expect going into it. The gist of the program was explained to those of us involved: we would be paired up with someone from Sinai Residences and then once a month we would spend time with them doing different activities. After our first time visiting Sinai, we were emailed a list of partners. I found my name and saw yours next to it. At that time, I didn't know anything else about you besides your name: Marsha Leifer. Now that we've met. I know that there is no one else who I would rather have as my partner. You're full of boundless amounts of liveliness and love. You're funny, witty, thoughtful, unique, youthful, bright, and just fun to be around. I remember that at the end of our first meeting, when we were told that our next session would be a Chanukah party, you turned to me and without skipping a beat, said "So, should I tell you my size now so that you can get me something?" When Chanukah came, it was you who greeted me with a wrapped gift of a sudoku book because you had told me how much you enjoy playing it and you wanted me to learn so that we could share a hobby. I feel extremely lucky to get even a small dose of your shining personality each time we meet. You brighten my day when I see you, with your dyed hair, cool jewelry, and awesome sense of humor. From the few times we've met, I've already learned so much from you.

When we're not coming to visit you, we stay back at school and learn so that we can better understand how the "elderly" are viewed. I put elderly in quotation marks because when it comes to you, Marsha, I can hardly call you old. One of the first things we discussed in class was social stereotypes that people tend to have regarding the elderly. But Marsha, you fit no mold. You completely smash all preconceived notions of what older people are thought to be. From what I can tell, you are in excellent physical condition and you are sharp as a tack. I say with absolute confidence that none of those common stereotypes apply to you. Another topic that we looked at was how the Torah views the elderly. The word used is zaken and the Torah defines a zaken as anyone who has acquired wisdom. This is quite logical because someone who is older than you has acquired more wisdom from their life experiences.

Marsha, I know that I have so much to learn from you; not just from your previous life experiences, but from the way you carry yourself today. Even before I met you, just from the description of the Better Together program, I knew that I would learn from whomever I would be paired with. But now, after meeting and spending just a little time with you, I realize that I have much more to learn than I thought I would from anyone else. From even the smallest things you say or do, I can learn. And I hope I can take a page out of your book. If not a page, then at least a line; because I know that even a single line can make me a better person. Maybe that line will teach me how to brighten up people's days and never stop making people laugh. Maybe it'll teach me how to be open to learning and trying new things. Or maybe that line will simply teach me to be nice to people without thought, just because it comes naturally.

So Marsha, I know you meant it as a joke, but you really are the one who is teaching me things. And, that funny one-liner really does sum up my participation in Better Together. First of all, I am learning from you. Secondly, it's just one example of the many jokes that filled up our time together and the laughs that followed as a result. Just like you told me: as long as people are smiling and there's happiness, then you are happy too. And I am a happier person because of you.

NAMES, NOT NUMBERS® A MOVIE IN THE MAKING, TELLS STORIES OF NINE SURVIVORS

The Names, Not Numbers: A Movie in the Making Holocaust education program for 8th graders premiered its documentary film on Sunday, March 17 at Temple Beth Shalom in Century Village.

Chronicling the lives of nine Holocaust survivors, as well as the personal experiences of the KHDS 8th grade students who worked for months on this project under the direction of **Rabbi Dr. Mordechai Smolarcik**, Faculty Coordinator, and **Rabbi Ari Mirzoeff**, Instructor, the program transformed the traditional study of the Holocaust into an interactive program that taught the students about the Holocaust through the accounts of eyewitnesses. It also provided them with interviewing, filming and editing skills, and documentary film tools, while working with professionals--journalists, newspaper editors, filmmakers, and Holocaust scholars. Most importantly, it enabled our students to forge meaningful relationships with the survivors.

This program is generously supported by a prominent national foundation and we are thankful to be a part of it for the fourth year. We also acknowledge film-makers Michael Puro and Drew Aldridge, who worked with the students throughout the project. Thanks to our KHDS administrators and staff Rabbi Yehudah Potok, Chayim Dimont, Hadassah Smolarcik and Jill Kaminetzky, as well as to volunteer coordinators Karen Moskowitz and Sonja Nadritch for their assistance with this project. We thank Congregation Beth Shalom and Congregation Torah Ohr for hosting the premiere.

With hundreds in attendance, the program began with welcoming remarks from **Rabbi Dr. Mordechai Smolarcik**, followed by the film introduction by project creator **Tova Fish-Rosenberg**. Following the impactful film premiere, Head of School **Rabbi Yehudah Potok** gave closing remarks, students presented tokens of appreciation to each of the survivors and a reception took place in the social hall.

helped out with service projects around the community such as beach cleanups, food pantries, and park beautification.



GROWTH MINDSET IN ETGAR JUDAICS

"Growth Mindset," a term coined by Carol Dweck, and explained extensively in her book "Mindset," is a theme that permeates our classroom throughout the school year. Upon entering the ETGAR Judaics room one is greeted by a giant tree titled "In This Room We GROW Together" coupled with a verse from Devarim, "ki ha'adam etz hasadeh" (translated loosely: "man is compared to a tree in the field"). Shevat was all about growth as we planted our very own vegetable gardens in honor of Tu B'Shevat. We documented the growth of our gardens on a monthly basis in our growth mindset journals. How eye opening was it for our students to actually



experience the concept of life as they became partners with Hashem in bringing food into the world!? It now became clear to us that growth is a long process which necessitates care, time, and effort. The theme of happiness and serving Hashem

with joy permeated the month of Adar as we allowed ourselves to celebrate our personal growth and the growth of our garden! Nissan, lyar and Sivan had many connections to growth, spring, renewal, and getting ready for Kabbalat Hatorah. Our students have been ingrained with these valuable lessons throughout their various Judaic subjects and are departing with the deep understanding that the Torah way of life is truly reflected in the verse: "Eitz chayim hi lamachazikim bah, v'tom'cheha m'ushar." "It is a tree of life for those who hold fast to it, and those who uphold it are happy."

HIP HIP HURRAY FOR SENSORY DAY



Students in the Rosalind Henwood Early Childhood Learning Center enjoyed a multi-sensory experience during Sensory Day on March 5. This annual program offers children ages 2 through Kindergarten an opportunity to experience smells, sights, tastes, sounds and textures. Students rotated through seven different sensory stations that incorporated music, science, art, physical education, health and nutrition.

"The stations we developed incorporated the use of the children's hands, feet, mouths and whole bodies," explained **Gwenn Lerman**, Kindergarten teacher and Sensory Team Coordinator. She along with her co-faculty Sensory Team members, **Abby Kerzhner** and **Frumie Cohen**, planned and coordinated the program.



We did it!!! Thanks to all of our generous donors we have surpassed our increased campaign goal of \$700,000! What a wonderful way to conclude our 30th anniversary year!

Contributing factors to this success included our Annual Journal Dinner, Annual Parent-Child Golf Outing (see page 17 for the event wrap-up), Mega Raffle, Every Parent Campaign, Koppie Cohn Day of Learning program, GRIT program, general donations and tributes, Changebowl, and designated gifts including class trips and the Charles Scher Teacher's Discretionary Fund. We also want to acknowledge Ariella Mayer (8th grade), as well as the national foundation that subsidized the generous grant the school received thanks to her 1st place essay in the Better2Write competition (see page 4). This grant literally allowed us to surpass our campaign goal!

One of the main reasons our campaign thrives each year, is due to our very generous Major Gifts Society members. This year Major Gifts attributed to \$182,000 of the campaign. 

There is a well-known story about a man who came to Rabbi Yakov Yisrael Kanievsky (known as the Steipler Gaon, 1899-1985) seeking spiritual guidance and blessings for him and his family. This man was especially distraught over his poor health, and was worried that his condition was putting his family's livelihood in peril. After his audience

with the Steipler, the man walked out with a bewildered look on his face, which was noticed by the Rabbi's attendant. "What did the Rabbi tell you?" asked the attendant. "He told me to become the 'candyman' of my shul!" said the man, confused and despondent. The attendant was equally confused, as he had become accustomed to the types of blessings and advice that the Steipler would typically dispense, and so he decided to approach the Rabbi and ask for an explanation. "It's quite simple," said the Steipler. "To a child, the candyman is the most important person in the shul. Every week, they walk to shul with their parents and hope that the candyman will be there that week to give them a treat. Each child is praying that the candyman will be healthy enough to be there for them that week, and there is no more powerful prayer than those from children. Through the merit of the prayers of the community's children, this man will enjoy a complete and speedy recovery from his illness, and be able to provide for his family.'

Anyone who has observed the children davening at KHDS on a daily basis, doesn't need any outside references to highlight the power and sweetness of the prayers that come from our children. Whether in our daily minyanim, our middle school girls' morning tefillah, our elementary and early childhood classes davening and bentching in unison, our classes teaching the meaning behind their davening, and heartfelt Tehillim for those needing Divine assistance, their innocent and deep connection to Hashem through prayer is inspirational to us all.

So powerful and effective are the prayers of children that the position of candyman is auctioned off each year- often for thousands of dollars! I'd like to offer you an opportunity to share in the incredible zechus, merit, of our children's prayers.
