² Head of School Message



Rabbi Yehudah Potok, M.S. Ed., Head of School

There is an article that I recently read called, "Will you lose your job to a robot?" With a growing number of activities that robots are able to perform, the article debates what jobs will be left for humans in the not-so-distant future. As educators, we have never been able to fully and accurately predict what the workforce would look like twenty years, let alone fifty years, down the road, but as the changes in our world accelerate, it becomes more critical for educators to

provide an education that will allow our children to navigate an ever-changing world. Determining what is to be taught and how to teach it is the challenge educators face today.

Ken Robinson writes that, "the aims of education are to enable students to understand the world around them and the talents within them so they can become fulfilled individuals and active, compassionate citizens." From the lens of a Modern Orthodox day school, I would add that we also strive to teach our students how to view modernity with a critical eye, to embrace all that modernity has to offer that is consistent with our Torah values and reject that which is not, to inspire our students with a passion for life-long learning, and to gain a love for the land and people of Israel. So what are we doing, as a school, to achieve these goals?

There are a number of strategies that are helping us accomplish this goal. Hillel students learn how to ask the right questions. If one does not know what questions to ask, that individual will never find productive answers. Our students are learning to appreciate that intellect is a gift from G-d, but what they do with that intelligence is up to them. They are constantly reminded that hard work and dedication to doing one's best determines success. Grit, the ability to persevere when confronted with challenges, sets the limits of their achievement, not a predetermined measure of "smarts." The messaging provided by our teachers is that their potential is something to be developed, infinite, and dependent on attitude and vision. From a values perspective, the most important question, one that should always be in the forefront of our students' minds is, "How can I make things better in Hashem's world?"

Wayne Gretzky once said that the reason he was such a successful hockey player was because while others tended to race to where the puck is, he went to where the puck was going. This is what we as a school are doing. We do not seek to prepare our students for a world that was, or the world that is, but rather for a world yet to be determined. We cannot focus, exclusively, on acquiring information, but rather we seek to foster resilience, and promote confidence in our students that they can overcome challenges. The entire staff, teachers and administrators alike, are working to design classrooms and implement a curriculum that is cognizant of the task at hand. In the months ahead, we will continue to highlight how our school is preparing our children for life in the 21st century.

Message from the Principals

A few years ago a parent gave me a book entitled *This I Believe*, as a gift. The book is based on a 1950s radio show in which everyday people write a 500 word essay about their personal belief system. When I read the essays I was truly inspired about people's ability to put onto paper what is most important to them. So I challenged myself, to put onto paper my own educational belief system,

and here it is:

Connections:

I went into education because I thought I could make a difference in how the world taught children. I thought, if I could teach them the same information in a different way, they would have more success. I have found that I was wrong. No matter how we teach, what we teach, or where we teach, it's all the same. Yes, there are better ways, and exciting ways.... But in the end, it's really all about connections. Yes, teaching is about connections. I will say it again, teaching is about connections. It's about loving a child that is not your own flesh and blood and truly making it about them. It's having the firm mindset, "this is my kid, and I can't pawn them off to someone else." It's about internally silencing the outside opinions, and focusing on that child and doing right by them. Making sure that they know you love them for who they are right then and there and only at that point, showing them who they can be. I often have to remind myself that when I talk to children, I have to tone down the conversation of what their "potential is" because they are where they are right now. We need to get to know them, what they love, what they hate and what they are passionate about.

Connections allow children to be vulnerable. Connections help children want to work for their teacher/parent/coach they love and don't want to disappoint. They help us look for those "Aha moments" in that child's day, when they finally get the concept.... and that is what we all, as educators, crave/need. The "I got it" moment is our air, our rejuvenation for the next uphill challenge. Connections help us focus our teaching and formulate a future dream about ourselves, which we as educators, want to be remembered. Connections help complete our story as professionals, so that when our past students serenade us during that retirement speech that we all secretly wish for, they are equal to the final scene in *Mr. Holland's* Opus - https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ng3l4vEN3Dk.

I believe that for each of my 175-180 school days, I will begin with the end in mind, and ask myself, "how do I want to be remembered?"





Hadassah Smolarcik, M.S. Ed. Principal, Grades 4-5 and Judaic Studies Grades 1-8

From an early age, I was always fascinated by elephants. When visiting the zoo or circus, the elephants were the first exhibit I would run to observe! Perhaps the allure had to do with the largeness of the mammal, the tusks, the ears and certainly the trunks.

As a result of my fascination with elephants, I became quite knowledgeable regarding their etymology, characteristics and behavior. (Did you know that elephants are very empathetic towards their families and members of their clans?!)

Where am I going with this information? Consider the elephant that is trained to perform. The trainer attaches a relatively thin chain to the ankle of the animal while the other end is attached to a metal pole in the ground. Elephants can uproot entire trees, isn't the elephant capable of pulling out the pole from the ground with a simple tug? The elephant does not do so because since the elephant was a baby, the trainer attached the elephant calf to the same pole and being that the calf was not yet strong enough to break away, the calf surrendered and now as an adult animal, the elephant still assumes that he or she cannot break the chain!

From my years of experience, I have observed students who perceive themselves from a young age as unable to succeed in certain areas and as they mature and grow, they surrender without even attempting—this is known as "learned helplessness." Children with learned helplessness often attribute their inabilities to succeed with excuses such as, "I failed because the teacher hates me," "I can't do math so I won't event attempt to learn Algebra," or "I don't have friends because I am not smart."

At KHDS, the mantra that directs all learning is the notion of "growth mindset." "I may not have mastered a skill yet, but I have been through difficult situations before and I did succeed," is what we try to have the students understand and reflect. Teachers work on encouraging positive thoughts and focus on self-worth. We work on empowering a student to help improve the situations rather than allowing a child to resign to failure. Tomorrow is a new day and what happened yesterday does not mean one will not succeed in the future. You, as parents, should also support and invest the time and effort to help the child develop positive evidence and remind the child of their past successes. Instilling in a child self confidence in one area, will spill over into other areas as well.

We look forward to the amazing growth of every one of our students and encourage your partnership throughout the process.

New Mechina Program Offers Enrollment Opportunity for Students with Limited Judaic Studies Background

In keeping with our mission to promote the love and understanding of living a Modern Orthodox life to all students, for the first time, KHDS has created

a program for Middle School students who have not had experience with a Judaic studies curriculum. This fantastic program will offer these students the opportunity to catch up with their peers and to join them in their classrooms.

"It is incumbent upon us to ensure that our children are offered every opportunity to strengthen their Judaic skills, passion for Torah, to inspire pride in the State of Israel, and to ignite a love of living a Modern Orthodox Jewish life," said **Daniel Katz**, KHDS President.

Appropriately named, the Mechina (which means to prepare) Program teaches basic skills that will allow 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students to enter their regular Judaic Studies classes at the same level as their peers and to better prepare them for more advanced high school Judaics. "The curriculum is modified and adapted to the individual needs of each student," explained **Hadassah Smolarcik**, Judaic Studies Principal.

"Some students need more personal attention to focus on skill building, while others need to catch up on basics, or even on lvrit (Hebrew language) skills," noted Rabbi Shlomo Schwartz, who is coordinating the new program.

The Mechina Program is for middle school students who may be entering KHDS as a new student and who have a limited Judaic Studies background. **Rabbi Yehudah Potok**, Head of School, said that the greatest educational gift we can give to our children is to bring them to the path of Jewish learning. "This program makes it possible for all children to receive this gift," he added.

The Back Page



Joe Sharp, Executive Director

We seem to be inundated with news of tragedies and near-tragedies in schools and synagogues in recent years, and so it's no surprise that security is the most discussed topic among my contemporaries around the country. Undoubtedly it's also a frequent topic in your homes and places of work, and security on our campus is sure to be on all of your minds now, more than ever. Please allow me to reassure you that the security of your

children is, and has always been, our utmost priority, and we don't need more tragedies to spur us into action. We've long taken a proactive approach to campus security, balancing our desire for new innovations and practices with limited financial resources, while continuously assessing the effectiveness of the latest trends in security. In addition to the security enhancements we've made each year, we've implemented many more efforts over the past few months.

During teacher work week, our staff underwent another active threat response training with Guardian Defense. Their training and mock scenarios heighten our situational awareness and is reinforced by our monthly safety drills. If there is a silver lining to our students growing up with active threat drills, it's that their situational response is second nature. For our adult staff, this is a relatively new reality, so the training and ongoing consultation from Guardian Defense over the past 4 years has been invaluable.

We installed new exterior doors with armored glass on the gymnasium and Loewenstern Cafetorium, and we now have all four of our buildings secured with electronic access control. We've also recently added several new surveillance cameras. We've just installed the Gabriel Network, a multi-faceted system for alerts and communication, situational awareness, and crisis management using state-of-the-art technology. We're fortunate to have received State of Florida Security Funding for the new doors, access control, cameras, and Gabriel system.

We can never have enough available methods of instant communication under challenging circumstances. To supplement our various existing tools, we purchased additional radios for our safety team (our team of nearly 20 staff members trained to respond in certain situations and advise on matters of safety and security). As another layer of redundancy, we recently created a WhatsApp group to communicate security alerts to our staff, and have also been utilizing a geofence alert system from the **Palm Beach Sheriff's Office.**

Baruch Hashem, we have a 24/7 security presence and physical deterrents on our campus and are given critical training and tools on an ongoing basis. Though we hope, G-D willing, to never need these tools, we recognize that there are other enhancements and new technology being developed daily to aid our efforts. We've been so fortunate to have secured funding for our past projects, and hope that forthcoming government funding, private grants, and generous gifts from donors like you will enable us to implement those measures. However, while we continue our ongoing efforts to keep our children and staff safe, we first and foremost beseech our ultimate protector, Hashem, to bless us all with the ability to learn and pray at KHDS in safety and security.
