MASK MAKERS FOR OUR MEDICAL COMMUNITY



Rabbi Dr. Mordechai Smolarcik can usually be found in the school's Makerspace where he teaches robotics, 3D printing, coding, circuitry and other resources and tools used to think, design, test and create using innovative technology. But when the school transitioned to distance learning, he took the opportunity to help the medical community by printing 3D face masks in the school's "mini" Makerspace, located in his Boca Raton home.
