#### Rabbi Yehudah Potok, M.S. Ed., Head of School

#### Leadership Messages



Chayim Dimont, M.S. Ed. Principal, Early Childhood-Grade 3

So much has been written about Covid and how schools have adjusted their teaching and learning, I thought it would be nice to write about something slightly different. Over the past year, our community has had to physically isolate from one another, however, I believe that we have grown stronger in our ability to "come together." It would seem

that in the time that we are now living, when we would have every reason to split apart, grow distant, and retreat selfishly to attend to our own needs, instead, for the most part, parents and teachers—sometimes unknowingly—have banded together to support each other.

Parents have worked incredibly hard to find ways to assist the school in its current mission to promote continued in-person learning by making sure they follow policies and procedures, and take precautionary measures that have often meant curtailing socialization or major travel plans, and keeping children home when in doubt despite the difficulties that arise because of it. Teachers as well have forgone traveling and meeting up with friends outside of work in order to ensure that they are not potentially exposed to Covid. This joint effort of personal sacrifice has created a community of mutual respect and understanding culminating in a true feeling of being "in this together." Don't get me wrong—this has not been simple or easy; there have been frustrating episodes along the way. But I believe we are stronger for it. Our school community has had tremendous success thus far in keeping our school open to in-person learning, simply because we, both parents and teachers, have stepped up our game of what we want our school community to look and feel like by giving up personal comfort for the greater good. We have shown our vulnerability in order to serve our children in the best manner possible. Nobody signed up for this type of learning and I think we can all agree it pales in comparison to what we know is best practice. Teachers have had to reinvent themselves as to the way they teach and parents have had to invest more time and effort into ensuring learning success. Both parents and teachers have had to push harder than before, simply to accomplish success for the school community as a whole. Each has taken on these challenges with mutual understanding and respect. G-d willing when this is all over, and life returns to "normal," may we continue our efforts and advance to another level of shared support and adoration.

When I began my career, it was a commonplace ideology that frustration is good for children because when they grow up, the world will be full of frustrations. That is similar to saying that the world is a cold place—get used to sleeping without blankets!!! I have learned that what we really want is to raise children who have the

resilience, confidence and support to find or make the blankets.

I recently read an article about Walter E. Williams, a famous African American economist, commentator and academic who passed away this year. He was raised in Philadelphia by a mother who chose to take a job as a domestic servant rather than exist on welfare. As soon as Walter was old enough, he took on whatever jobs he could find in order to help with the bills. On weekends, his mother would take him to visit museums and libraries as she was set on bringing culture and knowledge into their poverty-stricken lives. She wanted her son to achieve excellence in life, to navigate the inevitable trials and tribulations and do his best to maximize his potential.

Walter was blessed with an excellent mind and was able to get through his schooling with little effort. One day, his teacher returned an essay and in front of the entire class, ripped the paper and said, "You can do better than that." Walter went on to recollect that this was the best teacher he ever had. The teacher did not want this bright student to go through life just scraping by, but insisted that he do more and demanded excellence. Walter later on achieved amazing success and served as a role model to countless people through his teaching and mentoring.

I was reflecting that today we live in an age where excellence through hard work is not valued enough. Diligence in figuring out a difficult Gemara or commentary, solving a difficult math problem or writing a theme paper is no longer what is valued as outstanding but rather we make the mistake of putting energy into standing out. Somewhere along modern history, we are losing the appreciation and recognition of genuine achievement and replacing it with superficial recognition. We are quick to accept an undeserved "A" for something that may be substandard, because it will make us feel good.

It is time for us to teach our children and to model for them that life is not about standing out, but rather about being outstanding.
