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## <sup>2</sup> Remembering Mr. Chayim Dimont, Z"L

On June 19, 2021, Katz Hillel Day School of Boca Raton lost their beloved friend, colleague and Principal, *Mr. Chayim Dimont*, *Z"L*.

"The two most important days of your life are the day you are born and the day you find out why."

- Mark Twain

This was the quote that followed Chayim's signature on every email.

Chayim began his KHDS journey on June 1, 1999, when he was hired as the Director of Early Childhood. As **Rabbi Kenneth Brander** noted in his eulogy, "Chayim was a dreamer with an implementation strategy." Over the years he professionalized the EC program and expanded his role through 3rd grade as Principal. Over the course of his 22-year KHDS tenure, he inspired thousands of children. His constant dedication and passion for education kept Chayim right where he wanted to be — with the children.

What makes the KHDS family so special is that we are blessed with leaders in our family who have devoted their lives to making our school a Makom Torah. Chayim was clearly one of these people. He guided and inspired with his loving heart and soul. His fundraising efforts built Aunt Jessie's playground. His love for theatrics and creativity brought endless fun. His Purim and play costumes brought laughs. His fireworks shows brought ruach. His Teddy Bear Day brought cuddly surprises. His daily EMET winner announcements echoed the halls of the elementary school. His carpool protocol was like a Broadway production (much like the quality of the end of year KTP performance that he always proudly presented). He was literally KHDS' biggest celebrity.

But that fun was also wrapped in hard work, countless hours of planning, learning and growing, and always being honest and present. He rallied through this year's Kindergarten graduation and then the 8th grade graduation of his youngest son, Ezra, as his final KHDS milestone. Although Chayim treated his KHDS family like blood relatives, his true love was (and is) for his wife **Michele** and children, **Albert** (KHDS Class of '16), **Orly** (KHDS Class of '19) and **Ezra** (KHDS Class of '21).









A memorial program honoring the memory of Mr. Dimont took place at KHDS on Sunday evening, October 10th as close to 200 participated in person and over 220 more virtually. Memorial tributes were presented by former Head of School Rabbi Samuel J. Levine and Judaic Studies Principal Hadassah Smolarcik. A memorial plaque that will be affixed to the wall outside of Mr. Dimont's office was presented and a memory book compilation was given to his wife, Michele, with another copy to be housed at school. The memorial video, produced by Rabbi Dr. Mordechai Smolarcik, left no dry eyes. Head of School Rabbi Yaakov Sadigh announced the official dedication of the school's entryway, "Chayim Dimont, Z"L, Entryway." Mrs. Michele Dimont then spoke heartfelt words and further explained the meaning of the entryway dedication, as that was where her husband could be seen daily welcoming students in the mornings and saying goodbye in the afternoons during carpool.

Rabbi Sadigh also announced that the **Chayim Dimont, Z"L, Segula Fund,** a fund created by Chayim, Z"L, and Michele Dimont to assist with alleviating the financial burden associated with the prohibitive costs of infertility treatments, had raised over \$55,000 to date. 

#### Rabbi Yaakov Sadigh Head of School

The great Mashgiach, Rav Zeidel Epstein, tells a parable about two boys who prepared for a road trip from New York to Florida. They got in the car in the evening and began their journey. A few seconds into the trip, one of the boys said to his friend, "pull over, I don't think we will make it to Florida." The friend asked whether he had

heard a noise from the engine or if they had a flat tire. The boy said, "How can we make it to Florida, 1,200 miles away, when our headlight only shines for 300 feet?" Said Rav Zeidel Epstein, "Obviously, no headlight can shine for 1,200 miles. We drive 300 feet and then see the next 300 feet ahead and so on, until we reach our destination. So too should one approach life — just move 300 feet at a time."

I always have a book club with my administrators so that we can constantly grow personally and as a school. This year, we chose to read *Atomic Habits* by James Clear. This best seller has given us an opportunity to truly internalize Rav Epstein's message of gradual growth. In his book, James Clear talks about how tiny changes achieve remarkable results. In order to bring about big changes, we need to develop good habits gradually.

Rav Shalom Noach Berezovsky explains in the Nesivos Shalom that there is a deeper reason why the angel said "Avraham Avraham" at Akeidat Yitzchak. The simple reason given by Rashi is that Hashem shows affection to our forefathers by calling their names twice. The Nesivos Shalom believes that Avraham was born with the great expectation that he would not be Avram but Avraham (with the hey in his name). At a young age, he was not ready to be Avraham. Hashem challenged him with 10 difficult tests. When he was able to overcome them, with the ultimate test of sacrificing his son, the angel announced "Avraham Avraham." You have reached the potential we knew you had when you were born.

When we look at our precious students who enter the Rosalyn Henwood Early Childhood Program at KHDS, we have so much aspiration for each and every one of them. It is crucial as educators to recognize the tiniest of their achievements and to constantly celebrate with them.

We are moving forward 300 feet at a time towards creating an amazing learning experience for our students.

There was once a man that went to visit his Rebbe. At some point during the visit they both decided to partake in an apple. Both the Rebbe and the student made a Bracha before eating the fruit and then a Bracha Achrona after they finished eating their apples. The student then asked the Rebbe,

what is the difference between you and me? We both made a Bracha on the apple, we ate it, and then both made a Bracha after eating it. The Rebbe responded that it is true that we both made a Bracha before eating the apple, however you made the Bracha because you didn't want to eat anything without first thanking Hashem for the food, however I ate an apple in order to give myself the opportunity to make a Bracha!

Imagine a white sand beach surrounded by bright flat turquoise water. Perhaps there are some palm trees swaying gently in the breeze and you have a cold drink in your hand as you lazily relax in this paradise on earth. This very picture could be the fulfillment of a Mitzvah, or the exact opposite. It could be a much needed vacation to recharge and reconnect, or it could be a hedonistic plunge into the very pressures that we are commanded to avoid.

How do we know which one it is?

The Mishnah in Brachot says that we are expected to bless the bad things in our life as if they were the good. The Gemorah goes on to explain that as human beings, it is not expected of



us to be able to make such a grand gesture, and therefore, on bad news we make the Bracha of Dayan HaEmet, the True Judge. Hashem is uniquely aware that it is not easy to maintain a constant state of awareness of our relationship with G-d. He therefore gave us many Mitzvot and the ability to sanctify even the most physical of pleasures like eating and drinking.

In partnership with our parents, we strive to imbue our students with a constant awareness of their relationship with Hashem. Just like the relationship between us and our friends and family is not constant, so too our relationship with Hashem is as well. Our challenge is to endeavour to keep the very concept of our relationship at the forefront of our minds. Why are we eating this piece of cake? Why are we learning math? Why is it important to be a good teammate when I play on the volleyball team? Why is it important to learn what Rashi says about this passuk?

May we all be blessed with the opportunity to keep our intentions in line with our goals of a strong, meaningful relationship with Hashem, and may we continue to partner in helping shape the lives of our many students.



As I begin to embark on writing an article for the *Herald*, I, first, make myself comfortable — a good chair, laptop and a hot cup of coffee. So what will I write about? I ponder and consider different topics while the scent of the coffee permeates my working space. Coffee!!! That's what I will write about! Americans

are obsessed and passionate about coffee, me included as I can barely begin my day unless I have enjoyed a cup of java!

There are actually many lessons that we can glean from coffee. A story is told of a young woman who told her mother how life was so hard for her. The daughter did not know how she would manage to go on as she was tired of struggling; just as one problem was solved, another problem arose. The mother took the daughter to the kitchen and filled three pots with water and placed each one on the fire. In the first pot, she placed carrots. In the second pot, she placed eggs and in the last, she placed ground coffee beans. After 20 minutes, the mother removed the pots from the fire. The mother asked her daughter to feel the carrots, they were soft. The other asked the daughter to break the egg; the daughter pulled off the shell and observed the hardboiled egg. Finally, the mother asked the daughter to sip the coffee that had cooked from the beans and water, and the daughter relished the taste and its aroma.

The mother explained that each of these objects had the same boiling water, yet each reacted differently. The carrots which were hard became soft and weak. The eggs which began by being fragile became hard. The coffee beans were unique, however — as they were in the boiling water but changed the nature of the water.

"Which one are you?" asked the mother to her daughter. "When challenges come your way, are you the carrot that becomes soft and loses its strength, are you the egg which starts with a flexible inside but changes and becomes hardened, or are you like the coffee bean that changes the hot water and releases fragrance and delicious flavor? If you are similar to the bean, when things are tough, do you change the situation around you?"

The happiest of people don't necessarily have the best of everything, they just make the best of things that come their way.

What a great lesson to share with our children and next time you have a cup of coffee — think about this as well.

Recently I read an article in the *Harvard Business Review* about "Why Highly Efficient Leaders Fail." You might wonder why this topic resonated with me. What's the connection between leadership and the classroom? Is there even one? The article puts forth the premise that everyone needs to get tasks done. But, it's also important to build relationships and develop people so that leaders don't lead in an emotional vacuum, thus leading to their professional downfall.

The ability to execute and get things done is a key driver to success. Highly efficient leaders who fail are often task-focused, where productivity and profit may be their ultimate driving force. However, intense focus on efficiency alone, and getting the job done, might result in ignoring the people who help maintain a functioning and smooth running organization. This often results in "a negative impact on organizational climate and burnout of team members." Thus, a more harmonious approach of great leaders who balance task-focus (getting things done) with people-focus (inspiring and empowering others) is a much more valuable and sustainable approach to leadership.

The article continues by citing that in research conducted by Rob Anderson and William Adams for their book Scaling Leadership, the number one differentiator of effective leaders is strong people skills, such as listening, developing others and empowering their team members.

Let's work backwards. In the field of education we refer to it as Backward Design. Where do we start building leaders? In the classroom of course! It is essential that as we focus on providing our KHDS students with strong and adaptive academic skills, we must also work to develop their leadership skills in a manner that is people-focused. When students learn to listen to each other, relate to one another's strengths and challenges, support each other's growth and possibly even push each other to take risks, we are moving them along a path toward empathetic and people-focused leadership.

As parents, teachers and administrators shift our lens from studentcentric academic achievement to a culture where people matter, and the core of a highly productive learning and or professional environment are people, we provide our students with life skills that transcend the now, and prepare them for leadership and career success in the future.

Here's to working together to build future KHDS great leaders!

Students in Mrs. Zangre's 6th grade math class wrapped up their study of order of operations by creating PEMDAS ladders and solving various expressions to build the ladder.






We all celebrated Parshat Noach with an exciting Water Fun Day! The kids thoroughly enjoyed the water slides, foam and bubble machine, and of course,

Middle School students created decorations for the Sukkah at Sinai Residences and then personally visited to decorate.









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
