One of the reasons my son **Netanel** was looking forward to entering fifth grade was for the opportunity to try out for a spot on the hockey team. Netanel is a kid who pretty much eats, drinks, and breathes

hockey. On the day of tryouts, Netanel must have been up at 5 a.m., already pacing back and forth. When we arrived at the school gym, the boys were immediately given instructions: suicide laps, tons of push-ups, and shooting drills. That night, Netanel could not sleep as he anxiously waited for the list to be posted with the names of the boys who were chosen for the team. When he arrived at school the next day, he received the news he had been dreading: he, unfortunately, did not make the team. As you can imagine, Netanel was absolutely crushed.

When I got home that evening, my wife told me that he had gone to his room without dinner and was sulking in misery. I knocked on Netanel's door and sat down on his bed and shared the following message with him: "Netanel, you have two choices," I said. "You can continue to pout or beginning tomorrow, you can come home from school, drop your bags and go into the backyard and do suicide drills, push-ups, and take 50 shots at the net in front of our garage." Netanel came home the next day and did just that. We had recently installed a brand-new garage door that year. That door became riddled with a hundred dents from top to bottom from all his missed shots, but Netanel not only made the team the next year, but he also went on to become one of the best players on the HANC Hockey Team.

Security. There has been a marked increase in the number and frequency of antisimetic attacks on Jewish people and institutions over the past year. In particular, the attack on the synagogue in Colleyville, was quite near to where my

family lived just a few months ago. The individual that was arrested for assault and vandalism to multiple Jewish stores and schools in Chicago was caught by the security cameras in the Yeshivah in which my son is a student. To say that we need to be vigilant, is no longer a nice statement, but rather a creed which we need to live by.

How is Katz Hillel Day School of Boca Raton handling this new reality? **Rabbi Sadigh** and I have held multiple meetings with **Mr. Todd Polikoff**, the new COO of the Jewish Federation of South Palm Beach County, and **Mr. Ted Morris**, the head of security for the campus. In these meetings, we have discussed the multifaceted realities of our private property being part of the largest Jewish campus in the United States.

Today, there is so much talk about learning loss as a result of the pandemic. Schools are scrambling to address this important issue. As **Ron Berger** writes in his article, *Our Kids* are Not Broken: "Of course, they've lost some of their academic progress. The pressure to measure and remediate this 'learning loss' is intense; many advocates for educational equity are rightly focused on getting students back on track." But equally important, says Berger, is capitalizing on all the opportunities our students have had to become more resilient during these trying times. More than ever, our students are graduating high school and college, lacking the grit and determination needed to navigate the daily challenges of life. One silver lining during the pandemic was that our children were presented with situations to learn these skills.

Thankfully, our talented educators at KHDS are methodically filling in the academic holes from the past couple of years while at the same time teaching our children critical thinking skills, how to problem solve, and make good choices. We may come up a chapter or two short, but we are confident that our students will be well prepared and become contributors to society and the greater world around them.

It is hard to believe that the past two years have seen our lives and our wellbeing thrust into turmoil. We experienced life-changing challenges and profound events of historical significance that left us with a deep understanding that we could not predict nor control. The pandemic changed the way we live, leaving no

aspect of our lives untouched. Now we are trying to return to normalcy, stability, and relief. As human beings, we keep trying to understand and look for something that will give us comfort with hopes for a better tomorrow.

We, together with Jews around the entire world, are reading the Torah portions that recount the story of the Jewish People being freed from Egypt and their subsequent journey through the desert. The lessons that the Torah teaches us offer much insight and should help us with the deepest questions we are now facing.

Throughout the forty-year journey, the Jewish Nation had to declare the ultimate declaration of faith in Hashem. At KHDS we are passionate about STEM education! There are many ways to foster an appreciation and interest for STEM learning in our students, from a young age.

Our primary goal is to develop critical thinking skills in our students through rigorous, project-based, and

experiential learning. Thinking critically is the "pinnacle of the accumulation of knowledge and experience." Developing critical thinkers is a journey through a range of strategies. Students should have the <u>freedom to learn</u>. We need to give the freedom to think back to our students. By allowing our students to explore their own thoughts and opinions, we help them develop their own point of view on topics, instead of telling them what to think. This increases students' sense of ownership of the problem, and promotes creative approaches to finding a solution, thus elevating their capacity to think critically.

Next, we should encourage <u>project-based learning</u>. Solving real-world problems gets students out of the classroom and into the real world, even if it's virtually. This is a skill that is paramount for success in life.

We continue with <u>student collaboration and teamwork</u>, which engage our students' critical thinking skills.

Lastly, giving our students opportunities to <u>make a mess</u>, where learning is "unguided and messy," encourages them to draw their own conclusions. Of course, this form of learning must be anchored by support from teachers in the form of structure, graphic organizers, guiding questions, and more.

I want to highlight two recent events where all of the above strategies came together to immerse our students in the critical thinking arena. At the CIJE VEX Robotics competition, our 8th grade robotics team had to work collaboratively, problem-solve on the spot when one of their two robots stopped working, think creatively and come from behind to win the competition!

The CIJE Drone Olympics allowed our 7th and 8th graders to work collaboratively to code and then fly a drone. Critical thinking skills were clearly needed to accomplish the challenging task of flying a drone successfully through multiple hurdles without crashing.

In conclusion, I would like to add that technology is a great tool that can further facilitate the development of critical thinking skills. Thanks to the hard work of our **Director of Technology and Innovation**, **Rabbi Gershon Eisenberger**, in securing funding, our school recently received nearly 420 new touchscreen DELL Chromebooks. This funding was provided through the **FCC's Emergency Connectivity Fund (ECF)**. The new school-owned Chromebooks can be brought home during the year for those parents who signed up for a school-managed device for their child(ren).

I look forward to continuing to share with you more opportunities where KHDS students demonstrate critical thinking skills and their passion for STEM learning. Hundreds of Chromebooks were delivered to KHDS thanks to the FCC's Emergency Connectivity Fund (ECF) and the efforts of Rabbi Gershon Eisenberger!

Imagine a world where humans must live with the lower part of their faces covered. Imagine only being able to communicate with your eyes. Imagine having your deepest emotions on display at all times. Welcome to the world of infants. Welcome to the world

of unmasked emotions.

A recent study published by the **University of Virginia** found that babies respond differently to eyes alone. "Their brains clearly respond to social cues conveyed through the eyes, indicating that even without conscious awareness, infants are able to detect subtle social cues," said **Professor Tobias Grossmann**. They can detect emotions of sadness, even when masked with a smile.

Those fortunate enough to work in schools know that young children in particular can interpret us, even when we try to cover our truest emotions with a smile or frown. The masks at KHDS have not been an easy part of life, for us, or our children, yet they have allowed us to see each other through the eyes of an infant child. A child that only sees emet, truth.
