

Your Own Lantern

As I reflect upon my first year as Head of School, I cannot express enough gratitude to the entire KHDS family and community for the warm welcome and support I have received. It was truly an amazing year of

growth and learning. I want to take this opportunity to send our students into the summer with a special message.

A student of the Rebbe of Ruzhin, Rabbi Yisrael Friedman, once approached him with the following problem: "Rebbe," he said, "when I'm here spending Shabbat and Chagim in Ruzhin, I feel so close to Hashem. Everything is crystal clear to me and I have no questions or doubts about life. It is when I go back home that I become confused and feel far from religion." Rabbi Friedman asked his student to sit down as he began to relate the following story: There was once a man by the name of Reuven who lost his way in the forest. Once the sun set, Reuven began to panic as he did his best to find his way out of the forest. Suddenly, from far away, he saw what appeared to be a light. He moved towards the light and discovered a man holding a lantern. "What is your name and what are you doing here," asked Reuven? "My name is Shimon and I am lost," he said. "I am lost as well," said Reuven. "Can I walk together with you?" "Of course," replied Shimon! So they walked together sharing the lantern until they finally made it out of the forest reaching a fork in the road. They now had a dilemma — Reuven needed to travel east to get home while Shimon, who had the lantern, needed to travel west. Once again, Reuven was left alone in the dark to find his way home. The Rebbe turned to his student and asked "what was the problem in this story?" His student answered that Reuven didn't have his own lantern. He had to rely on Shimon's light. If he had his own light, he would have been okay. "My dear student," the Rebbe said, "you have to create your own light."

During the school year, our students benefit from the light of their Rebbeim, Morahs and teachers. They daven and learn under the guidance of their teachers and mentors. The challenge is during the summer months when they are not in school. What is unique about the staff of KHDS is that they educate their students not only to perform in school, but to become life learners. As we inched closer to the last day of school, there was so much talk about how it is important to continue davening, learning and practicing Middot Tovot during the summer months. It is not only okay, but necessary to rely on our teacher's light, but we need to be working on creating our own light simultaneously.

I am confident that our students will shine wherever they will be this summer: camp, traveling or relaxing at home. I could not be prouder of their accomplishments this year and look forward to welcoming them back in August with their lanterns beaming bright.

Mazal tov to our graduates and wishing everyone a wonderful summer!





In science, elementary school students learned all about animal habitats! A habitat is a place where an animal lives, eats, and finds all the things it needs to survive. The students learned about mountains, grasslands, desert, tundra, forests, freshwater, and ocean. They played a game in which they matched an animal to the correct habitat.



Mathematics gives us hope that every problem has a solution! In Ms. Meyers math class, 6th graders worked on translating expressions.



7th grade scientists explored the digestive system through a frog dissection as part of their Anatomy and Physiology unit in Mrs. Tinio's class. They identified the major parts of the digestive tract and used it as a comparative study of the human body system.

KHDS gratefully acknowledges the Names, Not Numbers® program, which has taught our students about the Holocaust through the accounts of eyewitnesses and provided them with interviewing, filming and editing skills. Most importantly, the program enabled the survivors and our students to forge meaningful relationships. This program has transformed the traditional study of the Holocaust and KHDS has benefited tremendously through our participation in this project.

On Monday, May 23rd, the documentary premiered at Temple Beth Shalom in Century Village with hundreds in attendance. The film chronicled the lives of eight Holocaust survivors, as well as the personal experiences of the KHDS 8th grade students who worked for months on this project under the direction of faculty coordinator Rabbi Ari Mirzoeff. We also acknowledge videographers Lou Aguilar and Carlos Sanchez, film editor Drew Aldridge, and director Michael Puro, who worked with the students throughout the project.

Continuing with the Read Across America Week festivities, 1st and 3rd graders read together on March 1st.



Thank you to Mrs. Jill Gumpper-Brannigan for her years of spearheading the endangered species research project in 2nd grade. The entire 2nd grade general studies team worked with our students as they focused on learning about native Florida species.

The project was a collaborative multi-departmental effort, with students learning research skills on topics of interest. The social studies unit allowed the

students to research and compose reports, become socially aware, and also gain public speaking skills. In music class, **Mrs. Abby Brody** taught the students two different genres of songs about endangered species. And the art component, led by **Mrs. Lisa Pinkis**, challenged the students as they learned the process of silk-screening and designed their own



t-shirts using sketches of their chosen endangered species to make a stencil using a Cricut Maker® cutting machine. This vinyl stencil was adhered to a mesh screen, which is where the screen printing process begins. Students used fabric paint and a squeegee, as well as some muscle strength, to transfer their designs onto a t-shirt. The results were apparent as each student showed off their shirts during their presentations in April.



Mrs. Yael Roth visited elementary school students in April to teach them about horticulture as they prepared for the new garden, which will grow fruit, vegetables, herbs, and other plants. The children will learn by experience how the seedlings grow into plants with care and nurturing. The students also decided what they would like to plant in the garden! In May they began their first plantings with seedlings donated by KHDS PTA.


2nd graders made family bonfires (medurot).
