
The concept of Hakarat HaTov is one that is seeped in our Torah values. From Parshat Bereishit, when Adam is chided for lacking it, to one of the reasons that we recite Brachot before eating any foods, you don't have to go very far to find examples of just how

important this mitzvah is. This is a concept that we teach our students at KHDS, and one that we try to lead by example with as well. As an extension of this, I would like to expand this concept to our requirement to show genuine Hakarat HaTov to the **State of Florida** for their generous State Scholarship programs. This extends to the Academic Achievement Accessible Scholarship Foundation (AAA), Step Up for Students, Early Childhood Learning Coalition, and to the various county level programs that are tremendous resources for our families. A very specific thank you is also extended to **Teach Florida**, headed by the venerable Mr. Daniel Agua and Mrs. Malka Kownat for their tireless efforts to make these programs more diverse and more accessible to those in our community.

If we look at the impact of these programs, we see that this year KHDS alone will receive over \$2 million of State funding via the State Scholarship programs. As the eligibility requirements for these scholarships have been expanded, more and more of our families have been able to qualify, which has benefited both the families and the school. This additional funding has

creation, Hashem handled everything on His own. Whose participation did Hashem deem necessary at this point? Rav Moshe Feinstein writes that even though this is a dangerous statement and may lead heretics to claim there were multiple gods involved with making man, it needed to be said to teach us an important life lesson. Ray Moshe explains that Hashem "physically" created Adam's body but it will take man himself and "a village" to turn him into a "mensch." Man, similar to other creations, grows physically in both size and strength. But unlike the others, man must also undergo a process of emotional and spiritual maturation, which results from his own efforts guided and directed by parents, teachers, and friends. Prior to his creation, man was notified that he will play a major role in his own development together with his support team. Naaseh Adam – Hashem addressed him saying, "We will make man. You and I will work hand in hand. I will give you the capacities and potential, while you must be prepared to work at the lifelong task of working on yourself.'

Ultimately, fostering a growth and resilience mindset in our children is something that takes time and effort. We have another opportunity again this year to "Naaseh Adam"- together help our children become an Adam. It is an honor and a privilege to partner with you on this ever so vital endeavor.



allowed dozens of students that would not otherwise be able to attend a Jewish day school to receive the Jewish education they so richly deserve. In addition, the lightened burden has allowed many families to reallocate some of their funds to other areas and help support the lifestyle of Torah observance.

These State scholarships have also benefited the school by increasing the overall amount of tuition dollars that are collected. Many families are able to pay less out of pocket in tuition while still ensuring the school receives its fair share. As these programs continue to develop and the talk about making School Choice completely unrestricted in Florida, we expect these benefits to continue to impact both the families and the school positively.

It is with sincere gratitude to Hashem that we were able to start the academic year sans face masks, social distancing, and cohorts! We began the year with anticipation, enthusiasm, excitement, and with renewed energy and focus to educate our children.

Twice a day, we say the "Shema" where the Torah commands us to teach our children about mitzvot so that "they will speak in them while sitting in homes, while traveling, while lying down and getting up..." Why couldn't the Torah simply say that we should teach our children Torah so that they will speak about the Torah?"

The Ksav Sofer explains that it is not enough for our children to learn Torah and keep mitzvot while they are at home, but they must be educated to the extent that they keep Torah and mitzvot without prompts from us. It is easy to influence our children to act appropriately when we are present, however, when they grow and are no longer in our vicinity, we need to be assured that they follow in the Torah. The Ksav Sofer addresses the obvious question, "How then do we do this?" He explains that the way to ensure that our children continue in Torah is to instill in them Emunah and the awareness that the purpose of life is Divine Service and keeping Hashem's mitzvot.

The following lesson was told to me recently. A Rabbi and Rebbetzin ran learning groups each Shabbat in their community. The Rabbi had 21 boys and the Rebbetzin had 18 girls and both groups would learn and say Tehillim. The children received prizes for attendance each week. One week, the Rabbi and Rebbetzin asked the children, "What would they say to persuade others to come and join in the learning each week?" The boys said that they would encourage others to join because of the prizes; not one boy mentioned that the mitzvah of learning and saying Tehillim is what was important. The girls heard the same question, but without fail almost each girl said that one should attend because saying Tehillim and learning together makes them better. Most of the girls made no mention of the prizes.

The Rabbi was bewildered as to what could explain the different reactions? After discussing with the Rebbetzin, it became apparent that the different reactions lay in the different approaches. The Rabbi would make a big deal about the prizes and he would distribute them with great ceremony. In contrast, the Rebbetzin would emphasize how special it was for the girls to come out and say Tehillim together, and how happy it makes Hashem...she would then give them a prize.

The obvious outcome would mean that the boys would be likely to be motivated to do mitzvot if the mitzvah "was worth it." The girls were inculcated with an attitude that would encourage them to do mitzvot because by doing so, we become better.

In today's world more than ever, we need to do our utmost to teach our children the importance of mitzvot. We work so hard to develop children's minds; let us not neglect their hearts and teach them how a Jew must live.


KHDS is so excited to welcome our new B'not Sherut, **Ori**² -- **Ori Bar** (right) and **Ori Elyashiv** (left)!

This year we launched two new curriculums in Lower School: one in ELA (English Language Arts) and another in math, all with the objective of providing our younger students with the strongest secular education possible at KHDS.

The need for these curriculums stemmed from discussions with our general studies teachers, who wanted more robust, rigorous, digital, and differentiated curriculums to help address the learning needs of our diverse learners. British educationalist and author Martin Robinson believes that "the quality of curriculum that a school has shapes the quality of thinking that goes on in the school and therefore shapes the quality of the minds engaged in the common curriculum pursuit." This philosophy aligns closely with that of our secular teams, as we want to ensure that our students are engaged in learning that opens their minds, and fosters both critical and creative thinking with a tenacity and appreciation for learning.

Post-Covid educational gaps, stronger reading comprehension and writing demands, and the need to ensure that math skills are grounded in real world applications were amongst the rationale for revamping and enhancing the previous curriculums. A further consideration for our choice of curriculums was that both programs better allow our LS Etgar students to learn and work within the same arena of skill sets in ELA and math, at a pace that is differentiated for each student's learning goals, thereby aligning secular mainstream and Etgar instructional skills.

The search for a curriculum that would provide a continuity and scaffolding of skills along with greater cultural connections began in earnest for our Kindergarten through fifth grade students. Our general studies team explored various English and math curriculums. After attending presentations and gaining a better understanding of the foundation and premise of each curriculum, we chose two that best fit our academic and learning goals.

Wonders, a comprehensive research and evidencebased literacy program by McGraw-Hill, "is designed to foster a love of reading in all children." Through the exploration of texts, students develop daily skills in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. This program provides an extensive set of connected resources (literature, grammar, vocabulary, daily writing, and more) that give our teachers the tools to adapt and differentiate instruction in a manner that allows literacy growth for all our students.

Go Math! Florida by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt for K-3 is designed using the proven 5E instructional model (engage, explore, explain, elaborate, evaluate). The program combines content, authentic learning connections, prior knowledge, personalized and adaptive practice, assessments and digital games on their Waggle platform to help guide every math learner toward mastery of skills.

The feedback on the ground from teachers has been very positive, as they settle in to using the full scope and range of these new curriculums.


Elementary school Onegs are back in full "sing"!


4th graders used critical thinking and teamwork to "Save Fred," during a superfun STEM activity in **Ms. Janock's** class.

The Middle School lounge was reverberating with passionate singing and inspiring Divrei Torah at our pre-Rosh Hashana kumsitz. In particular, the song "Ki karov eilecha hadavar meod, b'ficha ub'lvavcha la'asoto"

eilecha hadavar meod, b'ficha ub'lvavcha la'asoto" was echoing in the halls. This passuk, which is found at the end of Sefer Dvarim translates as "the thing (Torah) is very close to you, in your mouth and in your heart, to observe it." At this juncture in the Torah, Moshe is encouraging Bnei Yisrael by stating that the Torah isn't found in the heavens or across the sea. Rather, it is very close to us, in our mouths and hearts. Moshe is instilling confidence within the nation that the Torah, though difficult at times, is attainable for all.

Rav Yosef Dov Soloveichik expounds on the above passuk and explains that the reason the Torah is close to each of us is because when we learn Torah, it isn't new information we've never been exposed to before. Rather, it is a review for each

of us. How can this be so? Chazal famously state, as babies grow in their mother's womb, they are learning Torah with an angel. We all have had the privilege of being a chavruta with a malach! Upon our birth, the angel taps above our lips (yes - that's what that imprint is from!) and we forget all that we've been taught. One can wonder - what was the purpose of learning it in the first place if we were destined to forget it all? Rav Soloveichik explains that this passuk is the answer. Hashem brought us into this world already feeling connected to the Torah and it is in fact close to each of us. As babies, we were gifted with Torah knowledge that came to us with ease. As we develop as Ovdei Hashem, our job is to put in the effort to access the Torah knowledge once again. The inspiring Torah lessons and values inform and guide our lives, as we work to remember all that we have learned in the womb.

At Katz Hillel Day School, we have the zechut to be partners with you and your children as they blossom into invaluable Bnei and Bnot Torah. We are looking forward to an incredible year of growth and rediscovery of the Torah that is already enmeshed within them!






