#### IN MEMORIAM OF OUR DEAR ESTI MOSKOWITZ, A"H



The passing of our dear, *Esther Tehila*, *A*"*H*, has created a deep void in our lives. There is an empty space in our hearts because anyone who knew Esti loved and adored her. She was an outstanding student, with tremendous charisma and a most cheerful demeanor. Her magnetic personality, ever present smile, and rare inner compass was admired by all. Rarely are such qualities evident in a child so young. Her boundless energy was contagious as she was never sedentary but always on the go. Many teachers spoke of her pure goodness and how she overflowed with happiness just to be with her family and friends.

Chazal speak of the influence of a person's name on their essence, and this could clearly be observed in Esther Tehila, A"H. In Megilat Esther, when Esther is brought before King Achashverosh, the Possuk states:

> ותהי אסתר נשאת חן בעיני כל ראיה "And Esther would find favor in the eyes of all who saw her."

The Megillah is telling us that the secret to Esther's being chosen was her grace and kindness. Anyone who met Esther claimed her as a member of their own nation. Esther had the unique talent of allowing others to feel as if she was one of them by instantly connecting and relating to whomever she met. She knew how to listen and see their needs, to concentrate on the other person and not on herself. Esti, too, excelled in relationships with others so that everyone wanted to be her friend and be in her company. Everyone felt uplifted by being in her presence as she radiated much "chen."

Esti also excelled in her relationship with Hashem, and her middle name, Tehila, personified this deep connection through her love of Tefillah. Tehillah means praise, יתהלת הי ידבר פי (May my mouth declare the praise of Hashem." (Tehillim 145:21).

Esti's tefillot were pure and heartfelt as she connected to Hashem with her davening and inspired all those around her. She delighted in the stories of Parsha and in learning Torah and her enthusiasm was infectious. Her real level of Yirat Shamayim, she kept hidden, מסתר, and only those closest to her were aware of her exalted and lofty neshama.

Morah Shira Sharp, Esti's first grade teacher, related a beautiful story. In June of 2020, at the height of the pandemic, the academic year was finishing and vacation was about to start. Everyone was happy to take a break from on-line learning on Zoom. It was the last day and Esti looked sad. When Morah Shira questioned Esti as to the reason for her sadness, Esti said that she would miss davening with her friends and camp was not yet starting for another three weeks! Because of Esti's fervent desire to daven with her friends, her fellow students, on a voluntary basis, they continued to daven together for the next three weeks, each morning on Zoom, until camp began! It was so rare for a six-year-old to have that level of excitement for Tefillah!

Ms. Devora Gutman, Esti's third grade teacher, recalled how Esti loved to learn. Ms. Gutman often used songs or movements as strategies to help students retain information. One day, Ms. Gutman wanted to video the students singing the math facts, but most were shy in front of the camera. Not Esti! She jumped right in and encouraged her classmates to follow. They all took her lead and lined up to chant together. This was her remarkable influence on others that always manifested itself in an unassuming manner with humility and refinement.

Esti will live forever in our hearts as we aspire to follow in her ways. יהי זכרה ברוך

The Power of Advocacy

I am writing this article right after my return from a very successful mission to Tallahassee to advocate on behalf of a hugely expanded state scholarship program. The expectations are that not only will the Unique Ability scholarships be expanded

to ensure that no needy student gets put on the waitlist, but that there will be a universal credit given to ALL students in the State. This is potentially an additional \$7,000 per student, regardless of financial need. This would be the most progressive school choice bill in the country, and would lead the way for other states to follow suit as well.

How does something like this happen? How do we get the state government to allocate public funds for our private schools?

This only happens through advocacy — strong, but more importantly, persistent advocacy. Starting with educating yourself on the topic and initiating conversations with anyone that is connected to the issue. Through the tireless efforts of **Danny Aqua** and the entire **Teach Florida** team, they have been building relationships with lawmakers from both sides of the aisle. This is not just through meetings with the Senators and Representatives themselves, but through meetings with staff members as well. And just as important as the meetings, is the follow up after the meetings. The lawmakers are people, and they appreciate building relationships with others, even if they don't agree on all elements of policy. Persistent relationship building is crucial to long term success.

As parents and educators, we have many things that we can advocate for on behalf of our students and children. We creating a nurturing environment where students are encouraged to ask questions, explore new ideas, and make mistakes, teachers can help to instill a lifelong love of learning in their students. When children feel loved, inspired, and motivated by their teachers, they are more likely to be enthusiastic about coming to school each day.



My favorite time of the day is greeting children at morning carpool, watching them literally run towards school. Such a love for learning is a testament to the strong bonds being formed with our students. As the Head of School of KHDS, I feel a sense of pride knowing that building meaningful relationships is a high priority for our faculty and staff.

At the beginning of the year, when we were expecting a hurricane, a student asked me, "Rabbi Sadigh, do we have school tomorrow?" I said "yes," expecting her to drop her head in disappointment. Instead, she jumped up in the air, pumped her fist and said.... "Yes!" That's the power of great teachers!

Lenny left me that day as he always does..... gave me another big hug and said...... "I'm so proud of you kiddo!" And this is why I do what I do.



would all like to see greater academic performance, more exciting projects, students that are inspired to greatness, and a myriad of other ideas. The important thing to remember is that it takes a lot of effort to make changes. Systemic changes do not happen without the superhuman efforts of many people. If you identify an area where you would like to see improvement, first of all, please know that we want to become better as well. #### Hadassah Smolarcik Judaic Studies Principal, Grades 1-8

I love orchids, and being that I do not have a green thumb, orchids are relatively easy to take care of. They are elegant and beautiful, but when the flowers fall off, the plant looks sorrowful and forlorn. The plants are bald and the branches no longer look beautiful. That's when patience must kick in, as the

plant will still require proper care because deep in the dark soil, possibilities are taking root. Suddenly, the orchid begins to blossom, the buds burst forth with beautiful flowers, and the cycle begins again!

Raising children reminds me of gardening — both take an enormous amount of planning and patience. It is the greatest of our functions to raise children, but it requires much care and love to grow our children into blossoming human beings. There is a lot of planning to get a garden ready — good soil, sun exposure, a water source, and exhausting digging to plant the seeds. Patience is necessary while waiting for the seeds to grow into saplings while constantly watering and being careful with the water, not too much, not too little! It is easy to get discouraged when the garden does not produce as quickly or as well as we hoped. Sometimes it takes a long time to see the results of our planting.

Just as the garden requires much care and attention for the plants to flower — our children require much care and attention to thrive. Parents are the primary mentors as primary education begins at home in creating and refining the character traits and social/ethical behavior to sustain the child as he/she grows. The Rebbeim and Morot can augment and steer the children, but ultimately the child is a reflection of the "soil" — the home in which he or she is being raised. Value systems seen in the home run deep in the veins of the children as the parents' actions speak loudly so that the child will model and repeat those behaviors seen and implemented. The influence of the home runs deep into the "roots" of the children.

Like the orchids in my yard, success is achieved at unexpected times. Sometimes, when we do not see the flowers, but rather the bare branches, we feel despair; yet, we know that the buds are there if tasks have been completed, and they will blossom into beautiful flowers.

#### Shireen Butman General Studies Principal, Grades 1-8

In the fall issue of the *Hillel Herald* we shared that we had launched two new general studies curriculum in the lower school. In this article I'd like to focus on the professional development opportunities that we put in place to support teachers, as they navigate the exciting but also daunting landscape of deploying new curriculum in an engaging, honed-in, and studentcentered manner. You might be asking yourself: "Why

do teachers even need professional development? Don't they know how to teach?" There are many benefits to providing teachers with strong professional development opportunities:

1. <u>Improved teaching practices:</u> Professional development helps teachers stay up-to-date with the latest teaching methodologies and technologies. This allows them to incorporate new strategies and ideas into their classroom instruction, resulting in improved teaching practices and, by extension, better student outcomes.

**2.** <u>Increased student engagement:</u> Professional development helps teachers develop new ways to engage students in learning. This leads to increased student motivation and engagement in the classroom.

3. <u>Enhanced collaboration and teamwork</u>: Professional development often involves collaboration and sharing of ideas among teachers. This creates a community of learners and helps teachers to work together more effectively to improve student learning outcomes.

**4.** <u>Improved teacher retention</u>: Providing teachers with professional development opportunities shows that the school values their work and is invested in their growth and development. This can lead to increased job satisfaction and longevity.

Over the past few months our lower school general studies teachers have received indepth literacy training from their McGraw-Hill instructional coaches. They initially began the process by learning how to start using the curriculum in a broad manner. After having the opportunity to use and explore the curricula content, they then moved on



to receiving professional development in areas that they felt they needed to gain further and deeper knowledge.

From a general perspective, we moved into grade-specific areas, such as phonics, writing, assessment, and more. To further strengthen and differentiate teacher learning, we are even providing our teachers with the opportunity to work one-on-one or in small groups with their instructional coach.

As a school that believes in providing our students with an excellent and challenging secular studies program, it is incumbent upon us to support the "pillars" that enable our students to learn and succeed: our teachers!


In advance of Parshat Chayei Sarah, 3rd graders made special posters to honor their Immahot.



#### Gwenn Baer Early Childhood Director, EC2-K

Our entire Early Childhood department recently had the opportunity to join hundreds of Jewish educators for this year's Early Childhood Educators Conference. It was an amazing day of collaboration and learning with other educators in our community, where we had the opportunity to grow and gain new information and ideas.

At the conference, we had the benefit of hearing from two fascinating speakers. **Mabel Ramirez** taught us about the importance of play planning, and **Lorraine Posner Arcus**, the author of *Torah Alive*, shared insights into her book. These two informative sessions shared pedagogy on important topics that are the foundation of our program: meaningful play and instilling Torah values.

Every month, each grade-level team meets to plan and discuss upcoming lessons and goals. We write lesson plans and discuss specific areas we would like to concentrate on and continue to develop. What do our children need? What can we add to our curriculum to help our children's development? What sensory components can we add? When should we introduce this new concept? How are we offering our children integrated experiences to learn through play? Teachers then share center ideas and create materials to bring the children new and amazing hands-on opportunities to learn about each topic and objective. Early literacy concepts are learned kinesthetically. Children touch and hold letters. They create letters through clay, paint, and blocks. Fine motor skills are developed through sensory play, tweezer activities, beading, and writing. Children have a wide range of experiences to play with in a way to develop their social and emotional well-being, practice self-regulation, and learn the foundational academic skills they need to succeed in school and for years to come.

Jewish values and concepts are integrated in everything we do. Davening connects even our youngest children to Hashem and the classroom family. Parsha is taught through costumes and role play. Props are used to give children hands-on experiences to understand and expand on holidays and Parsha. The children have open-ended opportunities to express their understanding through art, sensory integration, story telling, and dramatic play.

Our days seem to quickly pass by and we stop to soak up every moment. We take the opportunity to capture these rare and precious early childhood experiences to create lasting memories and build the foundation for their love of learning and Jewish education.








3rd graders davened outside in the beautiful weather.




Students dressed up and prepared Divrei Torah in honor of Parshat Lech-Lecha.


In **Mrs. Braun's** science class, students worked together, building their teamwork skills by performing engineering challenges and improving their knowledge of scientific inquiry.

compares man to a tree of the field. How so? Trees, like people, are meant to possess strong roots,

stand tall and confident, and bear leaves and fruit that spread and carry on their legacy.

The passuk in והיה כעץ שתול על מים" ~ "He shall be like a tree planted by water". Chazal often portray water as a metaphor for Torah, because just as one can not survive without water, so too a Jew cannot survive without Torah. Trees also require a constant source of water for nourishment and growth.

#### Over the course of Shabbos we recite:

"צדיק כתמר יפרח כארז בלבנון ישגה" ~ "The righteous bloom like a date-palm, they thrive like a cedar in Lebanon." How is a tzaddik akin to both a date-palm tree and a cedar tree, which possess very different qualities? While a cedar tree is known for its solid roots and strength, making it perfect for superior building

material, a date-palm is known for the delicious fruits that it bears and its contributions to the world. A true tzaddik knows how to strike the appropriate balance between developing his own religious ambitions and growth with his responsibility to give to and inspire others around him.


