Since my first year as Head of School at Katz Hillel Day School, I have been speaking a lot about the topic of teaching our children resilience. In my closing remarks for this school year, I want to share another important lesson I recently learned about this ever-so-important topic.

The Midrash says that forty years before Shmuel was born, a Bat Kol, a Heavenly Voice proclaimed, "A child is going to be born who will be on the same level as Moshe and Aharon, and Shmuel will be his name." The Midrash says that all the expecting women at the time named their sons Shmuel upon giving birth, in the hope that perhaps their son was the baby the Bat Kol, Heavenly Voice, spoke about. When the real Shmuel, son of Chana, was born, the voice ceased, and everyone knew that he was the real Shmuel, the prophet of Israel.

The commentators share a fascinating insight on this Midrash. They explain that all those babies who were called Shmuel in the hope of being the prophet, all merited to have prophecy as well. How were they privileged to reach such a level? Our Chachamim explain that every mother truly believed that their son would be the prophet Shmuel. She therefore educated him from the time of birth in the ways of the Torah, watching what he ate, and how he spoke, helped refine his middot, and encouraged him to surround himself with good friends. Every one of these mothers had high expectations for their boys, and they all amounted to someone special.

In education, we often focus on the learning that takes place in the classroom as a barometer for student success and growth, but I want to add another dimension that I feel is critical to a wellrounded and rich student learning experience: the class field trip! In a time where many schools have had to cut their budgets for field trips due to a variety of fiscal or health related reasons, we at KHDS have aimed to continue in enhancing and

improving upon our students' experiential journey!

Let's take a moment to examine why field trips are good for students. One study found that incorporating field trips into a school's educational curriculum directly impacts a child's academic performance. A study by the U.S. Travel Association found that 59% of students who participate in field trips have higher grades than their peers. Additionally, it also discovered that field trips contribute to higher graduation rates and can also result in a higher earning potential during adulthood. In addition to the academic and professional benefits of field trips, one of the study's most notable findings was that 89% of those surveyed believed that the field trips they took in school made them more inquisitive and engaged in the world around them.

There are six primary reasons why field trips are important: enhancing learning, greater student engagement and improved retention, broadening horizons, enhanced critical thinking, social emotional development, and career exploration. As I look back upon this year, I am so proud of the range and depth of what our students have learned in general studies, in particular through the incredible offerings of our department's field trips! Our students explored alligators in their natural habitat of the Everglades; studied marine life in the Keys; went behind the scenes at **JetBlue** operations; experienced Apollo lift offs at the Kennedy Space Center; felt the pain from the testimonial of a child of a Holocaust survivor while visiting The Holocaust Resource and Education Center of Florida in Orlando; and lastly, learned about sustainable agriculture during their visit to Bedner's Farm Fresh Market, to just name a few!

Our thanks goes out to an incredible team of passionate, motivated, innovative and student-centered teachers who provided our students with opportunities and experiences to learn in a hands-on, creative and experiential manner, while making life-long memories!

Field trips aren't restricted to teachers and students! Field trips are also excursions parents can take with their children and what better time to explore or go on an adventure with our children than during the summer vacation! Wishing everyone a wonderful and restful summer!

KHDS gratefully acknowledges the *Names, Not Numbers* program, which has taught our students about the Holocaust through the accounts of eyewitnesses and provided them with interviewing, filming and editing skills. Most importantly, the program enabled the survivors and our students to forge meaningful relationships. This program has transformed the traditional study of the Holocaust and KHDS has benefited tremendously through our participation in this project.

KIDS TIME PROGRAM ANNUAL PERFORMANCE



Yom Iyun






Wax Museum

Mrs. Landau's 4th graders reviewed their grammar skills and made foldables.




Students in **Rabbi Kaplan's** class used a Kahoot game to review for their quiz in Dinim.


