One particular episode in Megilat Esther has long been a source of curiosity and contemplation for me. Esther's seemingly contradictory behavior—hesitating to approach the King since she had not been summoned in the last 30 days, yet later inviting him to a banquet only to delay her

request—is very surprising. How did she have the courage to push off her banquet to another day? Wasn't this disrespectful to the King?

A commentary on the Vilna Gaon's edition of Megilat Esther sheds light on Esther's actions and reveals a deeper understanding of her approach. Mordechai's counsel to Esther played a crucial role in her decision-making process. Mordechai urged Esther to recognize the significance of her position as queen and to act proactively in the face of the impending threat to the Jewish people: "And who knows whether it was just for a time as this that you attained the royal position?" (4,14)Esther responded by calling for prayer and fasting among the Jewish community, seeking divine guidance for her impending audience with the King. At the banquet, Esther hoped for divine intervention to guide her words and sway the King's heart in favor of her people. However, when no such divine sign manifested, Esther wisely chose to delay her request, recognizing that the timing was not yet right. Instead, she seized the opportunity to further develop the situation by allowing events to unfold naturally. In the interim, unforeseen circumstances arose that played into Esther's favor. Achashverosh's realization of Mordechai's past deed of saving his life and his subsequent order to honor him through Haman, set the stage for Esther's

In education, assessments and benchmarks are valuable tools for tracking progress, but they should not be the sole determinants of a child's worth or potential. Instead, educators should prioritize nurturing each child's unique journey and fostering growth at their own pace. By valuing progress over immediate outcomes, educators can inspire intrinsic motivation, holistic development, and a lifelong love of learning in their students. Just as Esther's patience and strategic delay led to the salvation of her people, so too can patience and belief in our students lead to remarkable achievements in education. By embracing slow yet steady progress, educators can empower children to reach their full potential and become lifelong learners, one day at a time.

Anyone who knows me knows that I am a huge proponent of STEM education, but even more so of girls in STEM.

With the explosion of artificial intelligence in all areas of our lives and professions, it is imperative that we expose our students

at a young age to opportunities, technologies, and creative resources that will allow them to grow and enhance their analytical, problem-solving, design, and programming skills.

Over my years of teaching, it became apparent that more male students gravitated towards STEM subjects, encouraged by teachers who felt that they possessed innate critical thinking abilities and showed interest in STEM topics. I often felt that many more female students would be more inclined to and less intimidated by STEM subjects if we stood behind them and showed them that they could absolutely tackle the higher order and "out of the box" thinking required in the STEM fields. Directing and promoting females into STEM has become a passion of mine! We have to flip the lens for our girls from STEM is "not for you" to "you can learn anything with perseverance and dedication."

On February 7th, 2024, our middle school Vex Robotics team competed in the **CIJE Vex Robotics Competition** for local South Florida Jewish schools. This year, for the first time ever, we had an all-girls team participate along with the boys! This was no coincidence, but rather a concerted effort to encourage, promote, and expose our KHDS female students to STEM opportunities and build their confidence so that they too can tackle and succeed in the STEM arena! I was so proud of all the robotics team members, but seeing the girls on this team thrive and shine validates all our efforts to encourage more KHDS girls to participate in clubs such as robotics. There is more work ahead, but this small moment of success is one that I will cherish for a long time!

Parents who want to partner with the school can also seek out-of-school STEM opportunities for their children. **Girls Who Code** is an international nonprofit organization that works towards bridging the gender gap in tech and offers programs during the year and in the summer that parents can explore for their children in 3rd grade and above.
