The dust has settled, the last nail has been hammered, and the sound of construction has been replaced by something far more delightful—the voices of our students filling the halls of our brand-new expansion building. There is nothing quite like walking through the gleaming new classrooms and seeing our children engaged in learning, able to

stretch out, move freely, and thrive in an environment designed for their growth.

This magnificent new structure now houses ten spacious classrooms, a new and improved Nurse's office, a dedicated Admissions office, a larger and more comfortable office for **Morah Hadassah** (because let's be honest, she deserves it!), a new teacher work space where our incredible educators can plan, collaborate, and recharge, and, perhaps most excitingly, a larger Beit Medrash, where our students can immerse themselves in Torah learning with even more room to grow—both spiritually and physically.

And just when you thought that was enough, there's more! By putting this beautiful new building into service, we've been able to free up much-needed space in our other buildings. The result? A brand-new Lower School Science Lab where our young Einsteins can mix, measure, and make a mess (all in the name of scientific discovery, of course). Additionally, our Early Childhood staff now has a brand-new collaborative workspace where they can share ideas, plan amazing activities, and conspire on how to keep up with toddlers who seemingly never run out of energy.

Building a brand-new facility in the heart of a bustling school campus while keeping classes in session, maintaining safety, and ensuring that no child accidentally wandered off wearing a hard hat—was nothing short of a herculean effort. Imagine threading a needle while riding a rollercoaster, and you'll get a sense of what this project entailed. Coordinating construction crews, deliveries, and the symphony of drills and hammers-all without disrupting the sacred sounds of learning-was a daily balancing act. In Parshat Terumah, Hashem commands the Jewish people: "ינעשָׁר לִי מִקְדָשׁ וְשָׁבַנְתִי בְּתוֹכָם"— "They shall make for Me a Sanctuary, and I will dwell among them" (Shemot 25:8). The commentators point out a subtle but powerful nuance in this verse. Hashem doesn't say, "I will dwell in it," referring to the physical Mishkan, but rather, "I will dwell among them." The true purpose of a holy space isn't merely its walls and structure—it's the people who fill it, the learning and spiritual growth that take place inside.

Our new building follows this same principle. While the additional classrooms, offices, and workspaces are wonderful, what makes this space truly special is what will happen within it—the Torah that will be learned, the friendships that will be formed, and the bright future we are building together for our children.

Just as the Mishkan was a symbol of the Jewish people's dedication to Hashem and their shared mission, this new building is a testament to the strength and vibrancy of our KHDS family. Come to any Friday *Esti Moskowitz* Oneg, and you will be enchanted when you hear the students sing, "Hashem Yitbarach, Tamid Ohev Oti." Accompanied by the beautiful guitar playing of **Rabbi Drang**, you are sure to be carried away, and without realizing it, you will find yourself humming along! "Tamid Ohev Oti" is more

than a song; it is a phenomenon uniting Israel through faith, rhythm, and hope. "Tamid Ohev Oti" has captured the minds, hearts, and toe taps of Israelis, transcending political, social, and religious affiliation. "The rise of 'Tamid Ohev Oti' coincides with a deep longing for positivity, overshadowing critiques, leaks, and failures. Is its success simply a desire to believe that there are better days ahead, or a concession that maybe hope and gratitude are the only way to get through these times?" (The Jerusalem Post)

The pursuit of happiness is always something that we seek. The pursuit of happiness was identified as an "inalienable right" in the US Declaration of Independence. How does one achieve happiness? If I am hungry, I eat. If I want to feel energized, I choose to exercise. If I go on a vacation, I will be happy. If I had more money, I would be happy...but the key to happiness is not the "if." The key to happiness is not "out there" but rather inside every one of us. We all have what it takes to be happy right now. If we constantly think of what we are missing, rather than what we are blessed to have, we remove ourselves from the happy state of mind.

Yirmiyahu, the Navi, asks, "How can a living person complain?" Hashem does so much Chesed for us all of the time. Isn't it enough that He gives us life? As long as Hashem gives us life, we have the power to choose to be happy or to complain.

Reb Zusha of Anipoli was famous for his unshakeable joy of life. He lived in total poverty. One time, the Rebbe of Mezeritch sent his students to seek an answer from Rabbi Zusha regarding a question they had. "How can one bless Hashem for the bad as well as the good?" which is what the Gemara instructs. The students traveled to Anipoli, and there they found Reb Zusha learning from a Gemara with a face shining with happiness. He was dressed in faded and ragged clothing, and all around his abode there was evidence of dire poverty. When the students asked Reb Zusha their question, he seemed confused. "I am surprised that the Rebbe of Mezeritch sent you to me—you should speak to someone who has suffered; I have never had anything bad in my life!" The students then understood why their Rebbe sent them to Reb Zusha.

When a person's happiness is based on living and serving Hashem, no matter what happens, the person understands that it's an opportunity to rise to the challenge. We can appreciate and know that there is an endless list of wonderful gifts that we have each and every day. Let's teach this to our children and let it be our mantra too!

This year many of our lower and middle school students participated in competitions, from inschool multiplication and spelling contests to CIJE Vex Robotics and Mini-Mu math competitions. One might ask, "Are there any benefits to young students engaging in healthy competition?" While competition is sometimes viewed as stressful or even too demanding, when structured

correctly, it plays a crucial role in student development. It challenges young learners to push their limits, builds confidence, and enhances academic and social skills in a fun and engaging way.

1. Fosters a Growth Mindset—Facing challenges teaches resilience, perseverance, and the importance of effort in achieving success. When children participate in competitive events, they experience both success and setbacks. Learning to handle disappointment and use it as motivation to improve is an important life skill.

2. Enhances Academic and Cognitive Skills—Competitions like math contests and spelling bees encourage students to push their intellectual boundaries. They improve critical thinking, problem-solving, memorization, and study habits.

3. **Builds Confidence and Self-Esteem**—Competing helps students overcome fear, showcase their abilities, and take pride in their progress. Whether a student wins or simply participates, the experience of striving for excellence and receiving recognition for their efforts boosts their self-esteem and encourages them to take on even more challenges.

4. **Encourages Teamwork and Social Skills**—Group competitions foster collaboration, leadership, and communication skills essential for success. Students learn how to communicate effectively, support one another, and work towards a common goal.

5. **Teaches Good Sportsmanship**—Students learn to respect opponents, celebrate effort, and handle both victory and defeat with grace. Students learn that winning is not the sole purpose of competing; instead, effort, persistence, and ethical behavior matter just as much.

When approached positively, competition inspires students to challenge themselves, develop new skills, and build the confidence needed for lifelong success. Let's continue to create opportunities that challenge, motivate, and empower our students!

EC4 enjoyed their winter unit with some math, literacy, sensory, and color sorting fun - oh my!!




Blast off! EC and Kindergarten science students learned to use the scientific method to predict what will happen when they mix vinegar and baking soda in a small rocket.



The 8th graders have been actively engaging in an immersive learning experience alongside our holy survivors, delving into the historical journey leading to the establishment of the State of Israel, whose

existence is currently being threatened since October 7th. We are extremely proud of our students for their preparation and dedication to the program that began in August.

Although we are fortunate to be able to participate in this program, once again, there is a substantial cost involved. We are currently seeking sponsors in the hopes of raising \$25,000 to cover the full cost. 
In science, students learned about volcanoes and why they erupt.

Parents joined with their children for a Chumash lesson during the December 25th program.




Students davened in the classroom, starting their day with meaningful tefillah.

Ima projects were proudly displayed in connection to the parsha.




Frugal Feast! Do you know how much you spent this Thanksgiving? Math students budgeted for a delicious meal for five people for \$100!




