Hadassah Smolarcik Judaic Studies Principal, Grades 1-8

As we reflect on the past months, it's remarkable how swiftly the academic year has progressed. It seems we were just setting our goals, and now we're entering the planning phase once more.

Soon, we will be reading the Torah portion of Balak, in which Bilam describes the Jewish People as a nation whose origins are firmly entrenched as rocks and hills. Rashi comments that the rocks allude to the Patriarchs and the hills to the Matriarchs. The loyalty of the nation to their forebears allows them to remain steadfast, firm, and strong in their commitment to Hashem. Bilam revealed the secret to the continuity and invincibility of the Jewish people to be able to withstand the challenges that beset them from their earliest moments of when they became a nation. Our faith is so deeply rooted in our Avot and Imahot, and so we have been able to withstand the winds of change that bankrupted the moral compass of contemporary society. We also survived throughout our history events of degradation, slaughter, and persecution. No nation has undergone such difficulties and tumult and can claim that not only did they survive, but that they thrived and have become stronger and more committed.

The Menorah, a tradition that has been transmitted from generation to generation, is what protected us and continues to protect us during this long and difficult Galut. Our heritage has been the glue that kept us together. While this heritage is transmitted through our Rebbeim and Morot, Rabbis and Shuls, it is the vehicle of parents to children that is most basic, fundamental, and effective. It is the responsibility of the father and mother to inculcate the child with the love and basics of our Judaism, and the school and Shul community to supplement and engage the child to love the Torah and Mitzvot.

The Torah introduces Jewish history with the story of the Avot and Imahot, emphasizing the significance of the family and the Jewish home. The strength of the family is the anchor.

Two women who were old friends met after several years at a resort. Mrs. G. had her son Moshe with her. Mrs. F. had not seen Moshe for many years and was taken aback at this mature, pleasant, and warm-natured young man. Mrs. F. declared, "I would give 20 years of my life to have a son like yours." Mrs. G. responded, "That is exactly how I did it. I gave 20 years of my life to have a son like this."

When parents sacrifice for their children with their time, pleasure, interest, and well-being, the foundation is concretized and will continue to serve as a source of satisfaction, pride, and joy for them and the entire Jewish nation.

This has been an incredible year of learning, growth, and achievement for our lower school students. I am so proud of each and every one of them for pushing through challenges, and demonstrating determination and perseverance while maintaining interest and motivation in their learning. As we head into the summer vacation, I want to take a moment to emphasize the

importance of summer reading for our children. While summer is a time for rest, exploration, and family fun, it's also the perfect opportunity to help students maintain the academic progress they've made throughout the year.

Research consistently shows that when students read regularly over the summer, they are far more likely to retain and strengthen the skills they've worked hard to build during the year, especially in literacy. On the other hand, children who don't engage in reading activities are at risk of experiencing what's known as the **"summer slide**," a decline in reading ability and comprehension that can make the transition into the next school year more challenging.

At Katz Hillel Day School, we encourage all families to make reading a natural part of their summer routine. Whether it's a few pages before bedtime, a shared book during a family trip, or independent reading time by the pool or at the beach, every minute counts. Reading not only supports academic success, it also fosters imagination, empathy, and a love of lifelong learning.

In addition to reading books, we encourage families to **engage children in thoughtful conversations about age-appropriate current events.** These discussions strengthen reading comprehension, vocabulary, and critical thinking while helping children build a more informed and compassionate view of the world.

Equally important is the **language we use when speaking with our children**. Summer is a wonderful time to enrich conversations by using **sophisticated and expressive vocabulary**. Research shows that children who are regularly exposed to rich language at home develop stronger verbal reasoning and communication skills. Asking open-ended questions, exploring big ideas together, and explaining unfamiliar words all contribute to their language development and academic confidence.

To support summer reading, we've provided a *Summer Reading List* filled with engaging and age-appropriate titles. We encourage each student to read at least one book (and hopefully more!) from the list and to share their reflections with us in the fall.

Thank you for being our partners in your child's educational journey. With your support, we can ensure that this summer is relaxing, enriching, and stimulating, setting the stage for a strong start to the new school year for our students.

they lingered, Hashem might give them more mitzvot. They felt overwhelmed—enough rules already!
